CONDITION OF OMAHA'S TRADE

Volume of Business in a Jobbing Way Continues Very Fair.

PROSPECTS IN THE COUNTRY IMPROVE

Heavy Showers of Rain Buring the Past Week Gave a Different Aspect to the Business Outlook-Omahu's Fruit Market Growing.

While the results of the past week have been not a little disappointing to the country at large. Omaha has reason for renewed hope and confidence. The fallure of the partial resumption of work at the coal mines to bring about a revival of manufacturing industries, and the continued exports of gold, have been causes of disappointment to the whole country. Independent of these causes of distrust, Omaha's prospects for future trade have been greatly improved by the opious rainfall of the past six days.

Country merchants and the traveling representatives of jobbing houses report a great change in the outlook for business in the enuntry. Some few localities are still need-ing a little more rain, but the state as a whole is in excellent shape. There has probably never been a time when the outlook for an abundant corn crop was any better at this present stage of its growth. As a result country merchants are expressing more confidence in the future of trade than at any time before since the commencement of the year. In some sections of the state farmers were actually preparing to move out, being thoroughly discouraged by the drouth. The coming of the rains has relieved their fears and the farmers will remain, with the pros-pect of having large crops to harvest.

With these facts before them the job-bers of the city cannot well keep from feel-ing very cheerful over the future of trade. No one anticipates any great rush or boom, as trude will undoubtedly remain rather quiet so long as the general conditions pre-vailing in the country at large are so very unfavorable. Merchants will be very likely to follow a conservative policy so long as the cry of hard times is heard in the land, and few will attempt to branch out very much for the present. What the jubbers do expect is a continuation of the present good, steady trade which they are now enfollowed by a brisker demand hen the corn crop is secure.

OMAHA'S FRUIT MARKET. The present month has witnessed a great growth in the fruit market of this city. The opening of an auction house has been the main stimulus and has been productive of far more good to the trade than was an-The wholesale fruit merchants of the larger towns as far east as the Mis-sissippi river have found it more convenient to send their orders to this city for Cali-fornia fruit than to try to get it direct from the coast or from Chicago. In con-sequence Omaha has suddenly jumped into the front rank as a fruit jobbing point and the season has only just commenced. As the season advances there is good reason to espect an increase in the amount of busiess transacted in this branch of the job-

The season has opened with prices unnsually low, in fact lower than ever be-fore, and this will have a tendency to stimulate the consumption in spite of the inclination on the part of consumers to cut off luxuries. During the past week cites like Fort Dodge, Des Moines, Dav-enport, Red Oak and Sloux City, Ia., St. Jiseph, Mo., grd Lincoln and Bestrice, Neb., have been large buyers on this mar-

AS DUN SEES IT.

Commercial Club and Manufacturers Association Should Be Harmonious. Mr. W. H. Roberson, manager of R. G. Dun & Co.'s mercantile agency, says:

"I was present at the meeting of the executive committee of the Commercial club last Tuesday and was very much interested in the discussion led by President Page of the Manufacturers and Consumers association. The executive committee was apparently very much relieved when a shrewd lawyer raised a technical objection to the consideration of the question at issue and so permitted the episode to escape through one of the side doors. Nevertheless, what Mr. Page and other members said found a lodgment in the minds of their hearers, and while he did not succeed in committing the committee to his ideas, they will not be "The Commercial club cannot fail to ap-

preciate the important work accomplished by the Manufacturers and Consumers asso-ciation. It would be both proper and profit-able for our growing club to place itself squarely on the home petronage platform if it has not already done so. Direct re-sults, benefiting everybody, are certain to billow a persistent and consistent advocacy of the principle. The central organization of the Manufacturers of Nebraska has entered upon an extensive campaign for the benefit of home industries. It will hold a series of meetings and give banquets at various Nebraska towns and cities for the express purpose of interesting citizens in me products and home manufactures. At such banquet the entire menu will be made up of Nebraska products, and in each city and town local home patronage clubs will be organized and encouraged. The Manufac turers and Consumers association has done enough already to win a prominent place among business organizations, and it is just beginning its career of usefulness.

At the excursion committee meeting the other day Chairman Weller struck a keynote when he reminded his fellow merchants that Omaha was not securing all the trade to which she is entitled in Nebraska and west-era lows. SNOW, CHURCH & CO'S VIEWS. Rains of the Week Revive Trade as Well

as Growing Crops.

Albert Andriano, local superintendent of Snow, Church & Co.'s mercantile agency.

"The abundance of moisture, the warm nights, the cloudy days of the past few weeks, have been what may be termed ideal corn weather. Heavy rains have fallen in most parts of this state, and crops are in prime condition. With a continu-ance of this weather for two or three weeks more corn will be high enough to shade

the ground, and unless we have an unusually dry season a large crop is amply

"Trade, like a barometer, is affected by the weather. The exceedingly favorable conditions which have prevailed of late have had a very perceptible influence on the number and size of orders from the country. Country merchants are ordering quite liberally for fall delivery, and wholesalers are reasonably well satisfied with the outlook. Trade in some lines still continues dull. Retailers report only a fair business, but wholesalers in most lines report a very encouraging condition of affairs. Clothing and dry goods merchants and manufacturers of overalls and shirtings say that orders are coming in quite well. A large number of these orders are for future delivery, and provided crop prospects continue as good as they are at present will no doubt be filled. Should affairs, however, take an unfavorable turn there is no doubt that a large number of them will be countermanded. Should everything remain favorable and the orders that are now coming in be filled, business for the last six months of this year will show up very well. Last year orders came in in large numbers, but were canceled before the season had advanced very far, making the fall business show up very poorly. The fact of the matter is, said a leading jobber, that merchants are not anticipating business, and there is a growing lendency to put in only sufficient goods when they needed money. It is my opinion, and I believe I am right, when I say that the custom of ordering in large quantities in anticipation of their wants will not be indused in to such an extent in the future as it has in the past. I am satisfied and every other wholesaler should be, that it is better for every one concerned. There is no necessity for a small dealer to carry a large line in any one class of goods. If he cannot unload it her arcuses the follower is forced to keep on band large quantities of goods and order far in advance. Should there be no d

Boot and shoe men report quite fair trade, with prospects of a good fall business. Grocers are doing a fair business. In hardware trade is not as active as it was last month. Dry goods men have had a very fair business during the entire spring, and orders now coming in give hope of a good trade for the fall.

'In summing up the situation it is safe to say that everything depends upon the corn crop. Retailers and jobbers throughout the country are dealing in futures. It is with all of them a question of corn or no crade. If favorable conditions continue to prevail this crop will be the largest ever had in the state, and it is for this reason that every change in the weather affects business favorably or unfavorably, as the case may be. The tariff will be settled before congress adjusted themselves to the new conditions. It is to be hoped by that time labor troubles will have been satisfactorily disposed of. With these conditions and a good corn crop, with a consummation of the local projects now under consideration, business at Omaha and in Nebraska will once more reach the high level of prosperity. It should be remembered, of course, that these are prospects and only prospects. Trade at this time of the year usually becomes somewhat dull, and continues so during the summer months. This year will be no exception to the rule, and indeed things may be a little bit duller even than in previous years, but when the time comes for business to pick up, as it will in the fall, then the renewal of trade in Nebraska will be the certain result of a good crop and a settled condition of affairs, just as certain as poor business and continued hard times will be the result of crop failure and unsettled condition of affairs it is not my purpose, nor is it in keeping with my duty, to take an optimistic view of the fuure, and for this reason I have been particularly oareful in this instance to give both sides of the argument, cause and effect, and I do not think that the greatest pessimist can honesty say that conditions and pros to suit circumstances."
