Came Eastward and is Charged with Leaving His Men in the Lurch.

GENERAL ADAMS STOPPING IN OMAHA

Deserted His Command at Big Springs

and is Now in Hiding-Westers at Old Fort Sidney Will Be Tried This Week.

Owing to the fact that Judge Dundy is out at Sidney trying the Commonwealers the federal grand jury did not convene yesterday merning. The jury will be called in session as soon as the judge returns and it will find considerable work to do, which has recently accumulated.

The federal authorities have been watching General Adams, who had charge of the gang of Wealers at Big Springs just before their arrest. It is said that Adams and a few of his soldiers have been in the city since Saturday and have been begging for provender from people living away from the vsiness portion of the city. The general would not strike for a back door handout, but would direct the efforts of his comrades. The federal deputies allege that while the Wealers were trying to stop trains at Big Springs Adams collected everything in sight and in company with a few friends skipped out, deserting his comrades, who were left penniless and without food. His command was soon afterward arrested and taken to Sidney. His former comrades have declared vengeance on the man who robbed them if they ever catch him. Marshal White said that there was no charge against Adams and the city officials will investigate his case if he is caught begging in this

Albyn Frank and party returned from a trip to Fort Sidney yesterday. They state that there are 208 Commonwealer under arrest and under guard of a force of deputy marshals in the old government buildings. The Wealers are divided, 160 of them being imprisoned in the main moreom of the old fort, while two groups eighteen each are under special guard, as hey are charged with interfering with mai trains. The men are provided with tin plates, knives and forks and tin cups. Each man is served with two meals per day, in rations of one quart of coffee, three-fourths of a pound of meat and the same quantity of bread. They eat their meals standing, as they are not provided. as they are not permitted to have an

The guards compel the prisoners to keep their quarters clean, and every day the men are compelled to take a bath, a distasteful duty to some of them, who actually re belled when they were ordered to use soap Since being imprisoned the men have mended their clothing, washed up and in

Alterations Made in Boundaries of Wards and Precincts. The city council held a special meeting as a committee of the whole yesterday afternoon to consider the matter of refixing ward and precinct boundaries. The task of remodeling was left to the city clerk three weeks ago, and since then he has been assiduously engaged in preparing the report

terday. The report was discussed at some length and was at length adopted by a vote which was unanimous with the exception of got the worst of the transaction. The effect of the change as provided by the committee is to reduce the number of voting precincts from eighty-eight to seventy-six, thus effecting a saving for the city of \$1,065 at each election. In the First ward the precincts are cut from eleven to eight and the ward loses about 150 voters. The Second ward loves an equal number of voters and the precincts are reduced from four-teen to eleven. The nine precincts in the Third ward are increased by one and the voting population is swelled by 951 votes, most of which are gleaned from what was formally the voting population for the precinct of the Property of th

which he submitted to the committee yea-

formerly the southern precincts of the Fifth In the Fourth ward the precincts are reduced from eleven to nine and a loss of 300 votes is suffered. The Fifth ward is by far the greatest loser by the transaction According to the new arrangement it has only seven precincts instead of eleven and only seven precincts instead of eleven and loses 790 vaters. One precinct is lopped off in the Sixth ward, leaving it with eleven precincts and 200 less votes than & had before. There is very little change in the Seventh, eighty votes being subtracted and one of the seven precincts done away with. The Eighth gains one precinct and 500 voters and the Ninth is left exactly as it was before.
