## COMMERCIAL AND FINANCIAL

Board of Trade Markets Were Very Dull Yesterday.

WHEAT WAS QUIET AND WEAK EARLY

Corn Opened Easier in Sympathy with the Weakness of Wheat-Other Cereals Sell in Consonance with the Leaders-Stocks and Bonds.

CHICAGO, Oct. 10.—The Board of Trade markets were very dull today. The uncertainty regarding the government report prevented heavy trading, and was responsible for moderate weakness. December wheat closed 4c lower, May 2c lower; May onts unchanged. Provisions finished with

Wheat was quiet and weak at the opening, then had a few minutes of moderate activity, while it tumbled down a further step or two, after which it recovered a trifle and became funerally dull. The traders evinced no disposition to make many sales or purchases, in view of the uncertainty of the government report. The usual routine news was not of a character to seriously dis-turb either the bulls or the bears. During the forenoon December kept within the range of 53%c and May at 5%c premium. The market recovered its tone toward the close, December selling up to 53%c, and May, which had its premium reduced to 5c at the same time, sold at \$3%c, closing prices were: December, 534,51584c. Corn opened easier in sympathy with the weakness of wheat at that time. May was offered at 50-5c, against 50-5c at the close yesterday. The number of cars inspected since yesterday morning was reported at seventy-three cars, compared with an estimate of 100. In the other lines shipments for four hours were only 124,500 bu, compared with 485,641 bu, on the corresponding time last year. It did not take seliers long to crowd the price of May down to 50c, after which there was enough recovery, at which the market stuck for a long time. Not for several months has trading been as light as today. A little buying firmed up the market at the close, and May finished at 50-5c.

The activity in outs continued, and a good day's business was transacted. The governing power still lay in corn. Buying orders were principally from the county, although considerable stuff was taken by parties here. Seliers were quite numerous, May started a shade easier, at from 31-5c to 13c, sold up to 33-5c and back to 33-5c, closing at 33-5c.

Provisions closed dull, but firm. The shorts were inclined to cover in a careful way, and the offerings were so light that a very little buying was needed to advance prices. Hog receipts were 18,000, and their price was quoted from 5c to 10c higher. Pork, at the close compared with yesterday's last quotation, was 10c higher; lard 75c higher, and ribs 5c up.

Freights were slow and steady at 15c for corn and 12c for oats to Buffalo.

The quantity of colory that is shipped to Omaha and other consumed here or shipped out to near-by points is very large. Other sections of the country, however, have been giving more attention to the growing of celery for market with no small degree of success. During the past two years parties in Nobraska have commenced to experiment with this vesciable, and so far with market success. This year about forty acres near Kearney were planted to celery and fifteen acres at Morroe, while there are small patches at Hebron and Florence. The K arney and Monroe crops were purchased by an Omaha house making a specialty of handling celery, and they are now receiving from these two sources about 400 dozen bunches per day. STOCKS AND BONDS.

Trading in Securities the Lightest in Volume for Many Weeks. NEW YORK, Oct. 10.—The trading in the Stock exchange today was the lightest in volume for many weeks past, and the spec-ulation was of but little interest. Except in sugar, St. Paul and Chicago Gas, the sales did not exceed 4,800 shares in any single stock, and but one reached that figure. The arbitrage business was smal, owing to the fact of it being a Jewish holiday, which kept many of the leading operators out of the market both here and in London. At the opening the market was heavy and a small fraction lower, but there was a quick recovery, after which the dealings became irregular, and duliness was the prevailing characteristic of the situation up to midday. In the early afternoon a selfing movement of small force set in, under the influence of small force set in, under the influence of which prices again declined. About 1 ociock a raily took pince, prices being well maintained until shortly before the close, when another reaction took place, the market closing weak and generally at a decline from the closing figures of yesterday. Sugar led in the transactions and was in demand to cover short contracts, the bears having taken alarm at the cable advices reporting the German sugar trade to have been rulined by the protection clauses of the new tariff bill. These purchases sent the stock up 2½ per cent, to 845 but in the later dealings there were fairly free offerings of the shares, causing a reaction to \$25,c. which left only % per cent of the gain. The preferred stock scored an advance of 15 per cent. St. Paul was the most active of the railway list and under sales by London and the traders induced by the heavy decrease in earnings for the first week in October receded ½ per cent, closing at that low point.

The other grangers were not largely dealt in and moved in narrow range, Burlington standing unchanged on the day, and Rock Island and Northwestern losing ½ per cent and ½ per cent and ½ per cent respectively. TRADING ALL ON A BASIS OF STRENGTH Not Enough Good Cattle to Test the Market, but Offerings Sell Well-Hogs

Open Slow and Close Strong and Bigher.

WEDNESDAY, Oct. 10. Compared with receipts for the first half of last week, supplies for the past three days show a falling off of some 700 cattle, while hogs have increased about 2,500, and sheep nearly 14,000 head. The cattle market was well enough sup-

plied as far as quantity was concerned, but there were hardly enough desirable fat steers on sale to test the real tone of the trade. All classes of buyers were out after supplies, local dressed beef men in particular, and as there were no good to choice beeves here sellers had no trouble in working off the common stock at good, strong prices. A few odds and ends of grass natives sold at from \$2.25 to \$3.50, and westerns sold largely at from \$2.75 to \$3.25. Eastern markets were all reported stronger, and the right kind of cattle would have sold readily at higher prices.

There was a strong, active cow market today, with prices firm to 5e and 10c higher than Tuesday. Everybody wanted cows, and the sixty or seventy loads on sale were not long in changing hands. Veal calves sold at rather firmer figures, and the same was true of bulls, stags and rough stock gen-

true of bulls, stags and rough stock generally.

A big business was done in stockers and feeders, but as the offerings were largely of low grade stock prices were generally pretty low, although not a particle lower than recently.
