Chicago & Eastern Illinois Pays Six Per Cent in Spite of Strikes.

TACKLE EMIGRANT MATTERS OCTOBER 15

Proposal of the Illinois Central to Sell Round Trip California Tickets via New Orleans for \$100 Rejected-Meeting Canadian Pacific Rates.

CHICAGO, Oct. 10.-The annual report of the Chicago & Eastern Illinois road, which was published today, shows net earnings for the entire year ending June 30, of \$394,-548. Gross earnings, \$3,860,114, against \$4,446,959 in 1893. During the months of May and June, while the great strike of the coal miners was in effect, the earnings decreased from the previous year \$240,000. Notwithstanding this falling off the road managed to pay 6 per cent on its stock throughout the year.

Commissioner Farmer of the Trunk Line association has fixed October 15 as the date for the meeting between the Trunk Line and Western Passenger associations in relation to the emigrant troubles. The meeting will be held in the city.

At the meeting of the Western Passenger association today a proposition of the Illinois Central to put in effect a round trip rate to California from Chicago of \$100, via New Orleans, was defeated.

The rules of the association were amended admit of the sale of mileage tickets through the agents of other association lines, the present rule requiring that all mileage tickets must be signed in the presence of an authorized agent of the line issuing the A resolution was adopted authorizing the

Trunk lines to apply, via association lines, the same rates as are made by the Canadian Pacific on domestic transpacific rates to China and Japan.

The question of holiday rates was taken

up, the proposition being to allow a fare of one and one-third for the round trip between points in the association not over 200 miles from each other. The question was passed temporarily to allow absent lines time to record their votes, but it will un-

doubtedly pass. The federal grand jury today investigated the charge that during the tast three years rebates were paid out by the Santa Fe Rallroad company to shippers in violation of the interstate commerce law. Addace F. Walker, one of the receivers of the road, was subpoenced to appear with books and papers which will, it is believed, contain much information. Mr. Walker was eu-gaged, however, and was excused until tonorrow morning. Two witnesses were present, one of them, Isaac Thompson of Kansas City, a well known cattle shipper, and the other a former employe of the Santa Fe at Kansas City named Taylor. The books of the company show that Thompson received rebates, but the grand jury did not get much information out of the shipper.

One of the Contempt Cases Goes Over Units

Yesterday Judge Scott called for the sheriff and demanded to know if he had yet succeeded in serving attachments of Mr. Edward Rosewater, editor of The Bee. The sheriff said that he had been unable to find Mr. Rosewater as yet, and understood that he was out of the city. Scott ordered him to bring the editor into court as soon as possible. He then called for Mr. W. D. Percival, and the latter soon appeared in the court room. Scott notified his especially appointed attorney to proceed with the con-tempt case against Mr. Percival. The attorney read the complaint made out by county attorney, which contained a verbatim copy of the alleged contemptuous article. This caused a smile to spread over the faces of the spectators, but Scott saw nothing funny about it. After the reading of the complaint Attorney Edward Simeral, who is representing Mr. Percival, filed his answer to the charges, admitting that he is a reporter for The Omaha Bee; that the said newspaper had a general circulation in Douglas county and the Fourth judicial district; that said Cunningham R. Scott is a judge in the aforesaid district; that said alleged contemptuous article was published in The Bee, October 5; but the defendant de-nied each and every charge set forth in the complaint and prayed that he be dismissed immediately.

Scott refused to do this, and set the hear-

ing for Saturday morning, fixing Mr. Percival's bond at \$500. This was excepted to by the defendant's attorney, and then ample bonds were filed with the clerk of the courts. Attorney Simeral asked that a date be set or hearing the charges against Mr. Rosewater, but Scott refused and said that he wanted the editor brought into court by the sheriff and then he would set a date for the trial. He asked where Mr. Rose-water was, and Mr. Simeral replied that he would be in York tonight, where he was going to deliver a speech to assist in de-feating Tom Majors. Scott wanted to know if it was a democratic or populist speech, but said that he didn't believe that he had any right to take judicial notice of politics

Does Not Like His Job. SOLVING A PROBLEM.

Figuring Out How Both Ends May Be Made

The problem of providing sufficient funds to carry the fire department through the remainder of the year which has been agitating the Board of Fire and Police Commissioners for some time past has been brought into the city council by the resolution introduced by Elsasser Tuesday night which provided for the transfer of \$10,000 from the general to the fire fund. At the previous rate of expenditure this would be just about enough to last the year out, but the extra expense of the general election will have to come out of this, and as this is estimated at \$10,000 the strictest economy will have to be used in

Comptroller Olsen stated yesterday that it would be an absolute impossibility to take the \$10,000 from the general fund for the fire department without seriously crippling the city and leaving a large deficit in the fund before the end of the year. There is a bal-ance of \$9,000 in the city hall fund which might be applied for the benefit of the fire department, but it was not unlikely that that would also be needed for the general ex-penses of the city. The only way that the comptroller could see in which the fire de-partment could be helped out was to postpone the payment of the December bills until the January appropriation ordinance. If this was done there would be enough money available to carry the fire department through.

The city had been exceptionally prompt in getting bills approved and placed in the appropriation ordinance at the earliest possible date and the comptroller believed that it would be no injustice to ask the small creditors of the city to wait thirty days for their pay, as most business men had to do. It is
