St. Paul Express. skill, attention and zeal depends not only the common or ordinary number of per acre, the beet farmer knows that he can depend on a fifty or one hundred per cent increase next year of like cereals from his best land, so bountiful is nature for the expenditure of aid in behalf of her own efforts. It results from this that the land of the sugar beet farmer rises in value rapidly, proving that not an iota of labor and intelligence is lost when well employed

in the right direction. We have in the United States a market at present for over four billions of pounds of sugar, and, as yet, we made last year only one-eighth part of the total sugar which we require! We have a magnificent climate for all kinds of sugar. Where that for cane sugar leaves off that for sorghum and beet sugar begins, and we have the requisite soil in the great west to produce beet sugar enough for the whole world.

Why should we not embrace this opportunity? We cannot do so on equal terms. Commencing at a very early period in our history, a tariff for protecting our farmers against wheat coming through the Black sea from Russia was placed and has been kept on wheat and it has resulted in siting our on wheat, and it has resulted in giving our agriculturists our own market, which, for seventy millions of people, is far more valuable than would be all the "markets of the world," filled as they are with cheap labor wheat. In like manner we have put and we maintain a fairly liberal tariff on many other agricultural products in order to keep our home market for our own farmers, and so keep up prices, if it is possible by legislation to do so. And here we have the new beet sugar industry just coming to the front, agricultural in its every aspect, in which farmers may engage to raise the raw material for a home market that calls from foreign countries for seven-eighths of our supply. But to engage in it the manufactur-ers of sugar are forced to compete with bounties, high tariffs, cheap beets abroad and with labor that gets only 25 to 50

cents a day. Of all times this was the most unfortunate one that could have been selected to visit with distavor an industry of such great promise, and so closely identified as it is with the agricultural interest. It really seems as if Providence must have smitten those guilty of recent legislation in congress toward sugar with a bump of destructive-ness, lending them the power to destroy rather than build up. It is this condition that confronts the western farmers, and they should lay politics aside long enough this fall to select candidates for the legislature who stand pledged to stand by the sugar industry until it can gain a faoting which will ensure it permanency in N.
