

of his inspectors. A few days ago The Bee contained an article showing how this alleged condemned meat was disposed of. In reference to that article. Gustoff Raff, a scalper whose name was mentioned, has this to say:

"All stock bought by the scalpers is inpected by the government, local and city inspectors. If a hog is sick and unfit for leaders have arrived, and as zone of those human food it is killed by the city inspector and sold to one of the rendering concerns, Also, if a hog dies on the scalper's hands, he is not allowed to take it out of the yards, and if the inspector thinks a hog is sick a scalper cannot take it out of the yards, but it can be sent to the packing house to be killed there, subject to inspection there. If we could buy 2 per cent of the slow hogs we would be lucky, but several of the packing houses have men in the yards who do nothing but buy cripples and slow hogs, and if any of them die they are allowed to take them to their places. We did not kill twenty cripples or a slow hog in four months, and all we kill goes through four inspectors.

"I think there are from twenty-five to seventy-five crippled hogs every day in the yards, and they are most always sold as quick as the car gets unloaded. The piggy sows, which are condemned by the government, are not condemned to be unfit for human food as long as they are healthy. The government only says by condemning them that they will not put their stamp on them for foreign trade. Did not all of these packing houses buy these sows by the car load before the government inspectors came here? shipped to points for slaughtering purposes where there is inspection, but not by the government. STATE BANK TAX AND SILVER

Two Features of Life that Will Be Heard of in Washington.

SCME STRAGGLING ATTACKS ON FINANCE Forecast of the Business of the Short Sea-

sion as Gleaned from the Few Legislators Who Have Already Gath-

ered in Washington.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 26 .- There is hardly the usual interest in the approaching meeting of congress which is generally manifested about the capital. There have been fewer arrivals of both senators and representatives than usual, though in the last days of last week a business air pervaded somewhat about the houses of the capitol as several members of the committee on appropriations responded to Chairman Sayers' request for committee meetings to consider certain of the appropriation bills. Those members of the committees living comparatively near Washington remained in the city only long enough to transact the business for which they were called together and then returned to their homes. There are probably not more than a dozen senators and forty members of the house in Washington today. Consequent upon this meager attendance of congressmen is the difficulty of presenting any definite or tangible forecast of proceedings. Nothing leaders now in Washington, a Among the opinions which one hears most frequently on the house side, and especially among southern democrats, is that there will be a revival of the effort to repeal the 10 per cent state bank tax law, and it is already that strong pressure will be brought to bear in that cause. There is a general impres-sion that the silver question will also cut a figure of some sort in the short session, but as few of the prominent democratic silver who are here have definite plans, it is im-possible to say what may be undertaken, The sentiment among many of the most conservative of the silver men is evidently against taking up the question at all, be-cause of the futility of such a course in view of President Cleveland's opposition to free coinage. All expect straggling references to the question, and some believe it will be made a leading issue of the session.
