The total quantity afteat from all the exporting countries last week fell 3,000,000 bu, short of the estimated weekly requirements of the importing countries, and about noon it became known that the stocks in this country at the points included in Bradstreet's visible supply statement had decreased 2,853,000 bu, compared with a decrease of only 1,155,000 bu, at the same places on the corresponding week of the year before. The one solltary hearish feature in the day's announcement was the receipt of 615 carionds of wheat at Minneapolis and Duiuth, but that is all shipping wheat, worth 5c to 10c per bu, more than the article which is used to speculate in.

Corn started strong, without anything particularly encouraging that was not previously known concerning it. The receipts here were 439 cars, compared with 345, but the course of the market yesterday was not quite satisfactory to the local shorts, and they were inclined to cover. The breaking up of the country roads, which was one of the reasons given for the firmness of the day before, was again referred to, and appeared to be one of the actuating influences against firmness this morning. Some confirmation of the effect of bad roads was found in the fact of the estimated receipts for tomorrow being only 160 cars. St. Louis sent bullish dispatches and buying orders. The opening price for May was 45½c, reacted to 45c, and then became strong again, advancing to 45½c, and closing with buyers at 45%c.
