MINK IS TO UNTANGLE SOME SNAFLS

System of Bookkeeping Required Has Caused Considerable Confusion in Accounts-Receipts Pulling Up a Little Over Same Period Last Year.

Messra, Oliver W. Mink, E. Ellery Anderon and Frederic R. Coudert, receivers of the Union Pacific, will arrive in Omaha Thursday. Their coming at this time is for two purposes, to attend the bearing In Denver on March 25 relative to the 100mile extension of the Union Pacific, Denver & Gull, in which the Union Pacific is interested as a stockholder, and, secondly, Mr. Mink, as comptroller of the Union Pacific, comes west to untangle a lot of snarls in the auditing department consequent upon the change in the manner of keeping the com-

The Interstate Commerce commission has suggested a uniform system of keeping rail-road accounts, and the Union Pacific has adopted the suggestion along with many other railroads. Heretofore the commission has been compelled to go through an infinite number of different systems of keeping rall-road accounts, and so laborious has the work of setting apart items become in order that a comprehensive report might be made that the interstate commissioners have suggested uniformity in the matter of keeping the books of the company. The Union Pacific adopted the suggestion of the commission. and now in many cases the auditor is at a loss-to know just where certain items should be placed.

Under the order of the court each of the several properties constituting the Union Pacific system must be kept separate, and in some cases there are five counts opened for one line of rails on account of mortgage divisions. While the branch lines are kept separate from the main face from a filthy mass of line, in some cases these branches do not earn operating expenses, and grave questions arise as to just how to keep these accounts, what funds are affected, whether the main line has the right to contribute material to the maintenance of the property. Mr. Mink comes west to put these matters of accounting upon a basis that will be intelligible to the Interstate Commerce commission and at the same time to unravel some of the snarls into which the Union Pacific worsted has

In this connection it may not be out of place to say that the Union Pacific shows considerably better in the way of receipts than for the corresponding period last year. of the firm of A. M. Kidder & Co. has bee appointed by the United States circuit court of Virginia as receiver of the Long Island Traction company. The appointment is in the nature of a friendly proceeding. In a circular to directors it is asserted a large majority of holders of the collateral trust notes have agreed to co-operate in the plan of reorganization, the condition being that \$500,000 be raised before March 28. It is the intention to pay the obligations to the receiver instead of the company.

The traction company was incorporated in 1893 under the laws of West Virginia, and capitalized at \$30,000,000. The Long Island Traction company was organized later in West Virginia for the alleged purpose of evading the incorporating tax in this state on the \$30,000,000 capital, which was mainly on paper. The plan of reorganization was precipitated by two suits brought by P. H. Flynn, a heavy stockholder in the Brooklyn City railroad, which is leased by the Long Island Traction company. One suit is to annul the lease of the city road, and the other is to prevent the traction company from saddling more debts on the leased property. The company's vice president, Jenkins, then said that an assessment of \$5 a share would be necessary to keep the traction company afloat.
