PERCENTAGES AS ARRANGED

Railroad Presidents Meet with Better Success Than the Traffic Managers.

Generally Supposed that the Burlington, Missouri Pacific and Chicago Great Western Were Granted an

Increase.

CHICAGO, March 25.-The presidents of the western lines, which are members of the freight pool, met today to consider the question of percentages to be allowed the different lines. A meeting of the freight traffic managers was held some time since at which the Burlington and Missouri Pacific made demands for larger percentages, as they had frequently been compelled to turn over business to competing lines. The freight traffic managers were unable to agree, and the presidents today took up the job where the managers had dropped it. The meeting was harmonious, and a scale of percentages was quickly arranged. It was decided that the allotments made today should apply on

all business done by the lines since February 1. Although no information would be given regarding the percentages, it is believed that the demands of the the Burlington and Missouri Pacific were granted. It was also rumored that an increased percentage had been allowed to the Chicago Great Western, but it was impossible to get any definite

information on the matter. Chairman Caldwell has handed down a de ision in regard to the basis of half fare rates for clergymen and railroad employes from the Missouri river to Colorado common points. The ruling was called for by a pecu-liar condition existing west of the river. The general understanding has been that the first-class unlimited fare.
