Wheat Was Extremely Feverish and Irregular During the Day.

PROFESSIONAL TRADERS SOLD HEAVILY

Corn Was Fairly Active but Weak, Considering the Strength in Wheat-Market for Oats Quite Active-Stocks and Bonds.

CHICAGO, April 29 .-- The wheat market was extremely feverish and irregular today and with the exception of a momentary drop at the opening it ruled higher than Baturday's closing price. July ranged from 63% to 65% and closed at 61% , or % c advance for the day.

It was a broad market, with the professional traders sching out their long wheat and the country picking up where knowing ones dropped it. July corn closed \$c lower, May oats \$c lower and provisions at slight declines. There was only one solitary fresh buil feature in the early market news con-cerning wheat, and that was swamp d by an accumulation of bullish features, and the market opened with everybody apparently bearish and offering July for sale at 635c down to 635c. The rank and file kept sell-ing for a matter of five minutes or more at between 635c and 635c, but they were surprised at finding so many ready buyers for their wheat. They became anxious and in another five minutes were thrown and in another five minutes were thrown into another wild whirl of excitement, batling with each other to get back the wheat Candition of Trade and Quotations on they had so confidently sold. In about half an hour from the opening the price had shot up to 65kec for July, or 2%c above the lowest it sold for at the start and 1%c higher than at the close of the regular session on Saturday.
