CHARGED WITH BUNCOMBE BY THE MAYOR

Police Commissioners Spend Two Hours Discussing the Subject Involved-Dispute Between Starkey and Shoemaker to He Settled.

At the regular meeting of the Board of Fire and Police Commissioners last night Strickler's anti-prostitution resolution was consigned to oblivion by failure to find a second. A resolution leaving the regulation of the evil to the mayor and the police department was passed over Strickler's protest, and consequently the attitude of the city toward the burnt district remains unchanged. Just before the board adjourned Strickler called up his resolution and asked that some action be taken. Coburn raised the point of order that it had never been seconded and could not, therefore, be considered by the board. A long discussion followed, in which Mayor Bemis stated that he was individually anxious to have the matter before the board for consideration. It was a piece of buncombe at the best, and after Strickler had used up a couple of hours in playing at

would like to make a speech himself. As the point of order was insisted on, however, he ruled that a second would be necessary, and the resolution died a natural death. At this point Strickler introduced a second resolution. Shorn of its voluminous whereses, it was simply a brief reproduction of the previous resolution, and shared the same fate. Then Smith introduced a resolution that provided that the laws and ordinances relating to prostitution should be enforced by the mayor and the police department, in their discretion, with the same impartiality and judgment with which other laws were enforced. Strickler made a vigorous protest against the resolution, which, he said, left everything to the discretion of the police department and was designed to shift the responsibility from the board to the Hayor. He read the sections from the charter, city ordinances and the criminal code touching on the subject and contended that the wasle intent and purpose of the resolution was wrong. Smith's resolution was then carried,
