Bears Won the Battle in the Wheat Market Yesterday.

JULY CLOSED NEARLY TWO CENTS LOWIR

Compared with the Weakness in Wheat Corn Might Almost Be Called Firm Although it Closed at a Decline.

CHICAGO, May 6 .- The bears were winners in today's ironing in the wheat mar-ket, July closing like lower. The soaking rains and lower cables caused the decline. July corn closed be lower and July oats %c lower, Provisions closed practically un-

changed. Wheat opened very weak as the result of the rain storms throughout the country since Saturday. The other market news, outside of a heavy decrease in the visible simply, was bearish in general, as it has been for a week or more. There was no been for a week or more. There was no export demand. Receipts were in excess

those of the year before. The other exporting constries were still pouring out Condition of Trade and Quotations on wheat in greater abundance than was needed by the importing nations. The opening trades for July were at from 63% down to 63%c, with numerous sellers at the higher and very few at the lower quotations. very radical a decline since Saturday and the fact that it brought the price under the rate at which puts had been sold caused some confident Luying, which caused a reac-tion to from 65% to 6% the in the course of the forty minutes. Following that there was a gradual decline to the lowest price made at the opening, and that was in turn succeeded by another rise to 65%, the ad-vance being due to a decrease of 550,00° bu, in the visible, or about 1,50,00° bu, greater reduction than had been generally expected. The visible supply being disposed of, the market then came under the depressing in-fluences with which the day's dispatches abounded. Minneapolis-Duluth receipts amounted to 3% carloads, compared with 30 cars on the corresponding day of the year befors. The total of the primary market re-ceipts was given at 20,000 bu, against 250, 600 bu, last year. Export clearances from the Atlantic ports, including wheat and flour, amounted to 178,464 bu. The amount on ocean passive in ct assed 90,00 bu. Rusthe fact that it brought the price under the four, amounted to 178.464 bu. The amount of ocean passase in r ased 90.0 bu. and th English visible increased 1.300.00 bu. Rus-sia's contribution to last week's shipments of wheat was reported at 40.00.00 bu. Those later items taken together were the influ-ences under which the market broke very soft, following the first effect of the reduc-tion in the visible, and caused a decline to 62% about an hour from the close. There being nothing heard concerning the working of any round lots of wheat for shipment from here, nor any but a triffing quantity at the seaboard, the decline gath-ered force as the end of the seasion ap-proached, and a minute or so from the close 62% became the trading price, and that was still current as the bell tapped. Compared with the weakness in wheat, corn might almost be called firm, although it closed at a decline. Foreign advices wers encouraging, and the advices from the sea-board were that some was being sold daily for export. The demand in the cash market was good and carloads were easy to dis-pose of, and the offerings of these had been about all picked before the speculative prices showed any radical weakness. The heaviness in wheat proved too much to con-tend against. Receipts were 180 cars. The decrease in the visible supply of only 1.751.-009 bu, a year arc, was a point which counted in favor of the bars. July opened at from 49% c to 49% c and closed firm at from 49% c to 49% c.

MONDAY, May 6. Receipts today were 731 cattle, 1,566 hogs, 198 sheep and 33 horses, as against 630 cattle, 3,686 hogs and 106 sheep on Saturday, and

1,463 cattle, 1.115 hogs and 675 sheep at the opening of last week. CATTLE-There were only thirty-one loads of cattle reported in the yards, a slight gain over Saturday, but a large decrease as com-

pared with Monday a week ago. In the way of beef cattle there was one right good load and several loads of pretty fair cornfed natives. As high as \$5.35 was paid for the best cattle, while the lighter and less desirable stuff sold at \$4.05/35.05. There was quite a string of fairish hayfed westerns in the yards, which sold at \$4.25. The demand for beef cattle was a little better than at the close of last week. At the same time the market was a little stronger and it

Cows and heifers were in a little more liberal supply than has been the case on most days of late. There was the usual good demand and the offerings were chared up at an early hour and at good firm prices. One bunch of 686-1b, heifers sold at \$4.25, while a single load of 878-1b, heifers brought \$4.30. Aside from those two bunches the sales were mostly of odds and ends. 


