OMAHA LIVE STOCK MARKET

Receipts Continue Comparatively Liberal in All Lines of Stock. PRICES RULE GENERALLY STEADY

Trade in Hogs Quite Brisk Throughout and Midday the Pens Had Been Well Cleaned Up.

THURSDAY, May 23.—Receipts continue comparatively liberal, and this is especially true of hogs, the supply for the four days this week totaling up 4,284 cattle, 25,531 hogs, and 1,660 sheep, against 3,015 cattle, 17,700 hogs and 1,723 sheep for corresponding period last week.

Eight of the thirty-seven cars of cattle received here directly from local houses from Kansas City, and the remainder consisted of butcher stock and stock cattle. No choice fed steers on sale. The trade was sluggish owing partly to the meager offerings and to the fact that eastern markets were reported weak.

There was some inquiry for fat butcher stock and heavy cows and hogs found ready sale at fully steady prices. There was also no special change in the market on calves, bulls, oxen, steers, etc.

Dealers were quoting prices for 25c lower on stock cattle and the decline this week is 30c to 50c. The supply was not very large, but owing to the slack demand was fully equal to the needs of the market.
