Bookkeeper Brainard Draws Large Check on His Firm and Leaves the City.

ACCOUNTS THOUGHT TO B SHORT \$10,000

Left on the Pretext of Going on a Vacation -Employers Think Bad Speculations taused the Troub-e-Experts Now on the Books.

A. L. Brainard, head bookkeeper and confidential clerk for Garrow, Kelly & Co., is missing and his accounts are said to be short. The firm estimates the shortage at about \$19,000. An expert is working on the books and bank check stubs now and the alleged shortage may be increased.

On Friday last Brainard asked leave to go to Missouri to see a man named Patten. He claimed that Patten had a scheme on foot whereby the two could make some money. Permission for a short leave of absence was the morning. Repeat once or twice each granted. Brainard did not return to his desk on Monday, as agreed, and it was thought by Garrow & Kelly that perhaps a business venture had detained him longer than he had anticipated when he left, so a telegram was daily, sent to Patten at King Grove, Mo. An answer F. came back from Mrs. Patten, saying that her husband and Mr. Brainard had gone into the ountry, but would be back in a day or iwo. Advices also reached Captain Kelly that Brainard was seen in Chicago on Saturday afternoon. It is thought by the members of the firm that Brainard never went to Missouri, but struck out for the east, and that Patten was an accomplice.

There is a custom among commission men that all business be transacted by check, no matter how small the deal. On Friday, after Brainard had applied for a short vacation, Mr. Garrow asked his bookkeeper for \$1. Brainard handed the money out of his pocket and said that he would draw a check for the amount and charge it to Garrow's accoun-The check was drawn for \$1,500, while the check book stub shows only \$1.

Several other checks were drawn that day, aggregating \$2,600 in all. When presenting the checks to the paying teller at the bank Brainard remarked that he had a lot of Iowa farmer customers in and that they wanted currency, as they had to meet some b.lls about

the exchange and in town. Brainard was an expert bookkeeper and h's books are all straight, but the checks issued do not correspond with the amounts noted on

the stubs.
Colonel Garrow said yesterday that Brainard had worked for him nine years and that he had all the confidence in the world in him. All of the business checks were signed by Brainard. He was a great society man, belonging to card clubs and frequently entertained at his home, Twenty-third and H streets. He left a wife and one child.




