WINTER WHEAT SHORT.

June Crop Report Shows Very Heavy Drop in Conditions.

CHICAGO, June 3 .- The June crop report of the Orange Judd Farmer published this week, based on data up to May 27, maker the average condition of winter wheat 71.5, or 13 points short of last month, the heaviest drop in condition ever recorded in a single month. Condition is high on the Pacifie coast, but in Ohio, Michigan, Indiana, Illinois, Missouri and Kansas the average is only 61. According to the report the total crop in the six states named will be but little more than to furnish bread and seed required within their own borders, while the total winter wheat crop this year, inthe total winter wheat crop this year, in-cluding the large production of the Pacific coast, will not make enough to more than furnish bread alone for the people in the winter wheat states east of the Rocky moun-


