Wheat had again a very weak opening. The starting point for July was over the range covered by 75% and 76%, with very little for sale below 76c. A considerable quantity changed hands at the last named quotation, however, and for a few minutes the market went staggering around as if the wheat out of doors had imbibed something stronger than water and had communicated its consequent unsteadiness to the price. Some scattered showers were reported as having fallen throughout Ohio during the night, and foreign markets went lower. That a feeling of depression which appears to be spreading among speculators as a consequence of reaction from the too eager buoyancy which recently prevailed caused the weakness at the opening was apparent. The crop news received from private sources was generally as disheartening as before, although there appeared to be a difference of opinion in St. Louis regarding the amount of damage done to the wheat crop of Missouri. Some reports claimed the prospect of three-fourths of an average crop, while others were confident there would not be over 60 per cent of an average raised in that state this year. The total shipments last week to Europe from the exporting countries amounted to about 9,000,000 bu, including the 2,400,000 bu, from this ecountry, 3,000,000 bu, from Russia and 1,440,000 bu, from Argentine. The market took on a firmer tone when it was observed that some weak holdings had been disposed of in the first few minutes of the session, the offerings came from the short selers and the buils saw then just where they stood. The first substantial assistance received by the buils came from finquiry which sprang up for cash wheat. At the commencement that was confined to the local business, but later Duluth advised a sale of 109,000 for export, besides 50,000 bu, for winter wheat mills. The price had many rises and falls from 75c to 75c, but finally bounced near the close to 77-gc and left off with buyers at 774c.

Corn was weak for a few moments at the start, but soon changed its tone.
