The coat market was not as lively and interesting as it has been for the past three days. About the same kind of business was going on, however, only on a smaller scale. There was a heavier supply of long stuff still offered, principally by commission houses for their country customers. The tone was easier and prices suffered a further decline. September ranged from 26'sc to 25%c, and rested at 25'sc.

Provisions were strong and higher, but the amount of fresh transactions was small. The bulk of the day's business consisted in changing over July contracts into September. How receipts were 20,000 head, or 6,000 head less than yesterday's estimate, and tomorrow's run is not expected to exceed 18,000. The estimate of stocks, cannot meats and lard shows less on hand than was generally supposed. Pork closed with a gain of 17½c, lard 2½c, and ribs 7½c.
