## STOCKS AND BONDS.

Feature of the Security Market Was the Great Irregularities. NEW YORK, Sept. 12.—The feature of today's stock market was, as on the previous day, exceptional irregularity. The volume of business showed a shrinkage as compared with that of Wednesday of about 125,000 shares, but the dealings were relatively well\*distributed. The leaders in point of activity in the railroad shares were St. Paul, Reading, Atchison, Rock Island and Tennessee Coal, and in the industrials Distilling, Sugar and Tobacco, in the order named. The fluctuations in either direction were noteworthy. and especially in some of the so-called specialties. Rumors of a probable new government loan in the near future and the continued strength of the exchange market had especially depressed ef-

the near future and the continued strength of the exchange market had especially depressed effects.

St. Paul was sold freely at the outset by holders who had bought in expectation of a larger disbursement on the common stock than the 1 per cent declared by the board. In this stock and the others of the granger group business has been created on account of the interview with President Miller, in which he acknowledges that through freight rates in the northwest are in a demoralized condition. Rumors of a protable new bond issue by the government were supplemented late in the day by further weakness in the quotations for the new government were supplemented late in the day by further weakness in the quotations for the new government 4s. Speculation /Influenced Along This Line to a Considerable Extent. NEW YORK, Sept. 12.—The Stock exchange records fall to confirm the reported decrease of 2 per cent today in the price of the new gov-ernment fours. The actual quotations yesterday were on the first call 12214, and 123 for the regwere on the lifet call 1229, for the coupon bonds. The closing quotations yesterday were 122611224 for the registered, and 12114612119 for the coupon bonds. The quotations on the first call on Monday were 1221461234 for the registered on Monday were 1214,61121% for the registered and 1214,6122% for the coupon bonds. Today's quotations on the first call were 1214,62121% for the coupon bonds. The first call today shows a decline of 4 per cent in the bid price of the fours registered, and 1 per cent in the coupons, as compared with yesterday's first call, and of 4 per cent of the registered, as compared with yesterdays first call, and of 5 per cent of the registered, as compared with yesterday's final quotations. Since Monday the registered fours are down 2 per cent in the bid prices, and the coupons 1% per cent. The cause of the easier tendency of the bonds is the belief in many circles that a new government loan is impending. As a matter of fact, the visit to this city of the assistant secretary of the treasury on last Thursday was popularly ascribed to negotiarions to this end. Well informed financiers descredit the rumer, and Mr. Curtis himself stated he was not aware of any immediate probable change in the treasury situation.
