**Big Receipts and Weak Cables Sent Wheat Down Monday.**

## EARLY INFLUENCES QUITE DEPRESSING

**Corn Was Quiet and About Featureless, but with Weakness the Rule—Provision Shorts Chased to Cover.**

**CHICAGO, Oct. 7.—Big receipts and weak cables sent wheat down today, December closing 4¢ lower. May corn lost 4¢ and May oats 4¢, but provisions made moderate gains.**

**Wheat was weak. Nearly all the early influences were against the prices, cables were dull, but weak, domestic markets heavy, the deliveries in the northwest large-about the largest on record and there was a heavy increase expected in the visible supply. All these had a depressing effect on holders, and it was more or less liquidated by short sellers, now in the lead. Later, however, when it became evident that the increase in the visible supply would not be as large as estimated, that feeling began to strengthen some, and there was a gradual rise in the price. But trade was quiet throughout and price changes comparatively narrow. December opened at 59¢/4c, sold to 59¢/2c, closed 59¢/2c. Trade was slow during the last hour, and December sold for 59¢/2c and closed there.**

**Oats were dull and about featureless, but with weakness the rule. The liberal arrivals, weaker cables and sympathy with wheat, were the main factors favoring October, and it sold from 29¢ to 28¢, and May from 28¢ to 26¢. The feeling ruled weaker, and short sellers, and May sold for 26¢ and closed there.**

**Provisions shorts were chased to cover, cholera talk which, although believed to be more exaggerated, still created some uneasiness and caused a moderate advance. Provisions—Pork, January, up 1¢; January ribs closed 2¢ higher; January ham received for tomorrow; Wheat, 25¢; corn, 69¢; oats, case 56¢; hogs, 24¢/head. The leading futures ranged as follows:**
