

DEFENSE NOT ALLOWED TO STATE INTENT

Cummings Was on the Stand the Greater Part of the Forenoon-His Story of the Patal THEIR TROUBLES ARE GROWING

Quarrel.

It was only a few minutes of noon when all of the testimony in the Cummings murder trial was introduced and the court adjourned to convene again at 2 o'clock in the afternoon, when the arguments to the jury were

The morning was occupied by the defense in introducing testimony which tended to show that the prisoner killed Vance in seifdefense. There were a number of witnesses on the stand and these in the main correborated the testimony of other witnesses for the defense. There was some contradiction in giving the details of the affair and it was understood that the state's attorney would devote a portion of his remarks to the jury to attempting to show that therefore their testimony should not be held as being credible.

The only matter in the trial vesterday which tended to arouse any interest in the case was the fact that Cummings was to be placed on the stand. His testimony, however, failed to develop anything new, as it was in line with that given by the witnesses for his defense. It differed in many respects, though, from that given by the state's witnesses.

Cummings said that after the first pool game which had not been settled for and after he had made a demand for money, two of the boys who had been in the game spoke threat-eningly to him. They refused to pay, saying that the boy who should have paid for the game had left the saloon. While the three ceiver is asked is the Union hotel at Six-teenth and Webster streets. were disputing Vance walked around the pool table and when he arrived in front of Cummings he had a billiard cue in his hand. Cummings swore that Vance said that h

would fix him, or words to that effect, and applied a vulgar cpithet to him. He then raised a billiard one and struck at Cummings. Cummings dodged and stooped to escape the blow, and as he did so he picked up a billiard cue. Before Vance had time to another blow Cummings hit him and he fell to the floor. This portion of the testimony contradicted some of Cummings' witnesse who swore that both Vance and Cummings had cues in their hands and struck at the same time.

In the course of Cummings' testimony hi attorney asked him what intent he had in mind when he struck at Vance. This ques-tion was strongly objected to by the prosecuting attorney and the objection was sus-tained by the court. Cummings, however, was permitted to say whether he feared inthe hands of Vance, and he answered that he did. The first question, however, lawyers say, raises a point that has never been raised in the district court of this district, and, if Cummings is convicted, will probably be made the chief grounds on which the case will be carried to the supreme court.
