

Nevertheless, he said that he did not wish the county attorney to be taken by surprise, and therefore gave him until yesterday to cite authorities which would

oppose the court's position.

When court convened yesterday, however, Judge Scott said that it would be useless to argue the point. He considered that the first count was sufficient to try the defendant, and therefore ordered testimony to be introduced under it. Spoerl's bill accounted for the following dogs drowned during the same partial. ng the same period: August 19, thirty August 20, twenty; August 21, fifteen; August 3, cighteen; August 24, thirty-seven; August 6, twenty-three; August 27, sixtern; Augus 28, none; August 29, seven; August 30,

wenty-five. COULD NOT SHAKE COLLINS. Collins testified that both Spoerl and Frank and been present at a number of the drown ings. Taxidermist Gilbert usually arrived after the drownings to skin the dead animals On cross-examination Collins said that he had been detailed to the pound by Captain Mostyn. His dut'es were to make memoranda of the number of dogs drowned and the time at which the drownings occurred. He did not know at the time what the memoranda were

wanted for. Collins said that on some days he was or the Iowa side of the river and could see everything that went on. He was able to count the doge plainly. He could see the dogs taken out to the river, being led if they were large or carried if they were small.

The defendant's attorney spent considerable ime in attempting to make the witness say that he was so far away that he could no distinguish whether dogs or some other ani-mals were being carried or how many were being carried, and that he could not recognize who was in the neighborhood of the pound. The witness would not say this, but p that he could see the dogs and distinguish and recognize the forms of the men. On other days the witness was on the Ne braska side of the river, in the immediate neighborhood of the dog pound.

He tastified that he had been watching the pound on every day between August 13 and 31, inclusive, except Sundays, August 18 and August 25. He identified the daily reports he had handed to the chief of police. Attorney General Churchill pleaded important business in the supreme court at Lincoln and stated that he could not well take the

matter up until after Christmas, In view of these conditions the parties in-erested in the hearing signed a stipulation, agreeing to and asking a continuance of the case until Thursday, December 26.
