STOCKS AND BONDS.

Speculation Was Decidedly Less Feverish Than for Some Days Past. NEW YORK, Jan. 8.—The local stock market today cut loose from the foreign influences that have recently affected it. The speculation was lecidedly less feverish than heretofore, and he volume of business showed diminished activity by the bear leaders, Previous to the pening the London cables reported increased ension in European political circles and frac-fonal declines in American securities at that tension in European political circles and fractional declines in American securities at that center. Lack of Snow on Low Vitality the Reasons Assigned. CHICAGO, Jan. 8.-Thoman's crop report oday says: Returns up to the 6th inst., inclusive, make quite a marked falling off in the condition of winter wheat during the past month. In the six states east of the Rocky Mountains, which furnish the commercial supply, the present condition is 78.1 per cent, against 84.4 per cent on December 1, and 94.2 per cent on January 1, 1895, a deterioration of 6.3 per cent as compared with last month, and of 16.1 per cent as compared with the January condition last year. This is the lowest January condition ever reported. For the whole breadth it is \$2.6 per cent, against \$6.7 per cent last month, and 94.3 per cent last January, or a falling off as compared with last month of 4.1 per cent, of 11.7 per cent as compared with January one year ago. Improvement is noted on the Pacific

The protection and benefit usually accorded by a covering of snow have been deficient this season, and owing to a small growth, thin stand and lack of vitality, the plant will be unusually susceptible to atmospheric changes. With a very favorable winter, normal vitality and growth may yet be realized, but with ad-verse climatic conditions, more than ordinary damage would result.
