BEGINNING MADE AT TAKING TESTIMONY

Witness Testifics that the Defendant Used Threatening Language and a Henry Club-Facts Determined by the Autopsy.

The trial of Jens M. Hermanson for the killing of John Starostka was commenced in the criminal court yesterday.

On December 30, 1895, John Starostka isited the saloon at the corner of Seventh and Leavenworth streets, where he became drunk and quarrelsome. He had some trouble, real or imaginary, with the bartender, Jens M. Hermanson, and the two had a dispute. Hermanson says that Starostka made a move, as if to draw a revolver, and that he then picked up a broomstick about eighteen inches long and struck Starostka over the head with it and ejected him from the saloon. About a week afterward Starostka died and Hermanson was placed under arrest, charged with manslaughter.

At the autopsy it was developed that the victim had a skull of unusual thinness and that a crack had been made in it by a blow, the crack extending for a considerable distance, and it was stated by physicians, at the time, that death resulted from the blow.

The defense take the position that the blow inflicted by Hermanson was not sufficient to crack the skull and say that the injury was received by Starostka in another fracas. It is argued that a blow sufficient to crack a man's skull, no matter how thin it might be, could not be struck with a light stick, such as a broomstick.
A jury was secured shortly after the noon

adjournment yesterday, the panel being as follows: John S. Doty, W. J. Carruth, Willis Coy, R. A. Dubois, F. W. Fitch, Archer Eke, E. B. Dailey, William Munecke, C. W. Scamman, Carl Kochs, W. D. Rule and H.

NATURE OF THE INQUIRY. Dr. Lord was called to the stand and testified to having been called to attend Starostka at the hospital and having assisted at the autopsy. He was unable to tell whether the injured man was rational before death, owing to the fact that he spoke Polish and the witness could not tell what he was saying. He described his condition before death and told about the autopsy. When the scalp was removed and the upper part of the skull taken off it was found that a crack had been made in the skull by some blunt instrument, extending from the left side of the head downward to the canal of the ear and thence diagonally down and back toward the base of the brain The skull itself was found to be only about one-sixteenth of an inch in thickness, about half the thickness of the ordinary skull,

and was translucent. The next witness was Andrew Hammer, who said he was in the saloon at the time Starostka entered. He heard Starostka and Hermanson having a dispute about the payment for some beer and heard Starostka swear at Hermanson and call him names. Hermanson threatened to put Starostka out and came from behind the bar to do so. He had a small stick in his hand and, after he had opened the door, he ordered Star-ostka to go out. Starostka refused to go and Hermanson hit, him with the stick. Starostka fell backwards on the threshield of the door and Hermanson, stepping over the body, took him by the coat collar and dragged him out to the sidewalk.

On cross-examination the witness testified that when Hermanson threatened to put Starostka out the latter said, "Me fix you." and put his hands in firs pockets. The wit-ness did not see any pistol. He identified a piece of broomstick about fifteen inches long as the stick used.

HERMANSON MADE THE THREAT. John Ryan, an employe in the freight depot f the Union Pacific, testified that he went into Hermanson's saloon about noon of the day of the quarrel. Starostka was there with one of his countrymen and was standing at the bar disputing with Hermanson about that he said it was Hermanson who said, "I'll fix you," and not Starostka. 
