Cables Again Played an Important Part in Wheat Prices.

BULL FEELING WAS QUITE GENERAL

Northwestern Receipts Were Heavier by Over One Hundred Cars Than the Same Day Last Year.

CHICAGO. Feb. 25.—Cables again played an important part in wheat prices, and much of the strength displayed today is attributed to the high foreign markets. Trade was heavy and the upward tendency in grain prices was continued. The market advanced 1c since yesterday. Corn and oats reflected some of the strength of wheat, closing 5c and 1c higher, respectively. Provisions were weak and closed lower.

Wheat had another strong opening because of the Liverpool cables showing another advance of 5c and to the operators having carried over 100 cars for the day.
