Finally Receives Pay for Government Work Performed During Reconstruction Days of the South.

The city of New Orleans has been given which has been pending since the good old days of the ku-klux. The case has reached a settlement, and it now looks as if the plaintiff will in a short time be enriched by the possession of several thousand dollars.
