The evidence in the case showed that the park commission, acting under the authority of the city council and mayor, took possession of Twentieth street as a boulevard, and opened the street to the full width of sixtysix feet. In so doing, the park commission took a strip of ground belonging to the Croft estate, and iying immediately south of Ames avenue, thirty-three feet in width and about 400 feet in length. The street had been dedicated at this point with a width of only thirty-three feet, but the park commission claimed to be ignorant of this fact and improved the street to the full width. An at-tempt was made on the part of the city to shift the responsibility of this action on the park commission as a separate department, whose action would not bind the city council mayor, but the court ruled otherwise, and it then became almost solely a question of fixing the value of the land. A number o real estate men were called on both sides to give their opinion of the value of the land taken. No two of them agreed as to what the land was worth, the prices fixed by these witnesses ranging from \$200 to \$2,500 per acre.
