NOW UNDER POLICE SUPERVISION. New Ordinance Applies to All Second-

hand Dealers. Yesterday morning the new ordinance which was recently passed by the city council, regulating the business of pawnbrokers, lean brokers, junk dealers and second-hand dealers, went into effect. The ordinance places loan brokers and second-hand dealers under police supervision, as only the pawnbrokers and junk dealers have been hereto-

fore.
Under the terms of the ordinance loan brokers of all descriptions are required to keep a record of moneys they loan on all articles of personal use which are deposited and not secured by chattel mortgages. They are required to make daily reports to the chief of police of all such transactions. They are also compelled to take out a license which costs \$100 for a year or half that amount for six months, and to give a bond of \$1,000.

Second-hand dealers must also comply with the provisions which require them to keep records of all second-hand goods that they purchase and to make daily reports to the chief of police. The license is fixed at \$30, and they must give a bond of \$500 each. Junk dealers pay the same license and give a like bond. The pawnbrokers are required to give a bond of \$2,000 and pay a yearly icense of \$100.

Another provision of the ordinance forbids

that any article which has been deposited and on which loans have been made shall be redeemed within twenty-four hours after deposit. This provision is meant to give the police time to investigate the ownership of any pawned article if their suspicions are aroused.

The new ordinance was drawn at the request of the police department. Frequent

tel mortgages are given, because in such cases the papers are open in the county clerk's office to the inspection of the police,

WILL PROSECUTE PARK OFFICIALS.

To Be Charged with Violating the City Ordinances. Orville C. Johnson of 2424 North Twentyfifth afreet has announced that he intends to have warrants issued for the arrest of the members of the park board and for Superintendent Adams on the charge of violating an ordinance of the city by keeping and maintaining a barb wire fence about Miller

park in the north part of the city.

The ordinance under which the case be brought has been in existence for some time. Under it a number of convictions have been secured against private citzens who enclosed their premises with the ch-noxious barb wire. It is stated that the c ty purchased Milier park before the ordi-nance went into effect, but it is held that this does not exempt the park authorities. In speaking of the matter, Johnson sa'd that he had no spite against the city, bethat he had no spite against the city, because he had never been arrested for violating the ordinance. He stated, however,
that he had heard of private citzens being
arrested under the provisions of the ordimance and he did not believe that the city
officials were less liable. He said that so
long as the ordinance was in existence the ty should be the very first to obey it.

Miller park is surrounded by a barb wire fence which was there when it was purchased. During the years that the city has been in possession of the tract of ground the
