

THE SMOKE STACK FELL

It Was of Solid Steel and Weighed Many Tons. DAMAGED HOPE THOUSANDS OF DOLLARS. Workmen Escape with Their Lives—People Thought It Was a Cyclone Not Down on the Schedule—Broke Through Hoop's Roof.

Last Saturday it will be remembered that a big wind and rain storm passed over this city—but a little previous to that an iron-fence looking stove pipe did more damage to one man in Omaha than the street wash-out and cave-ins have occasioned this season.

Workmen were busy putting up the mammoth steel smoke stack which connects with the furnaces of the Paxton building at Sixteenth and Farnam, and the Merchants hotel. The boiler is in the rear, just across the alley from Hoop's store. At the moment when the great pipe was all but plumb the monster hook and chain which held it in place snapped off short and down it came with such an unearthly noise, as to cause everybody to desert the postoffice building, a block away.

The workmen escaped with their lives; one poor fellow having a leg so badly lacerated that he may lose it. He was dragged to the very edge of the roof, where he managed to hang until assistance came.

The smoke stack itself is over four feet across and is mounded of heavy steel, weighing many tons. It fell almost its full length upon the roof of Hoop's store, and crashed in the building like so much kindling wood. Just imagine the state of affairs in Hoop's store. There was a panic, and, fortunately, the piano and organ were immediately under the fallen roof, did not get so easily. Pictures on the wall came rattling down as easily as a broom could sweep cobwebs off a ceiling. The crash was terrific.

But it's all over now; the carpenters and plasterers and painters will have the building in good order by Monday, and all the damaged goods will be brought up from Hoop's lard street factory, where they have received a thorough overhaul.
