WILL BE WARMLY RECEIVED

Union Generals Are to Have a Great Welcome at the Bluffs.

VETERANS CROWD TO HEAR THEIR CHIEFS

Stay of the Party Extended Two Hours and Plans Laid for a Great Demonstration Up Town.

Elaborate preparations have been made for the reception of the distinguished party of union generals who are making a campaign throughout the country against the enemies of a sound currency.

The party will reach the city this morning at 7:30, via the North-Western railroad. In the party are General Greer, Howard, Sickles, Sigel, Mulholland, and Stewart, Corporal Tanner and other prominent warriors who have gone forth to battle for the financial and industrial interests of their country with as much determination as they once fought for the preservation of the union.

The program mapped out for the reception of the generals is to meet them at the Northwestern depot with the Old Soldiers' McKinley and Hobart marching club, the McKinley Guard and Drum corps, the High School cadets, the Dodge Light guard and a band of music, all of whom will act as an escort to the Grand Hotel. Here the graduates could remain away all the forenoon.

The question of the purchase of copy books and the adoption of a new system of writing was a controversial subject which kept the board in session until nearly midnight.

Superintendent Hisey called attention to the fact that the board had been in session for the reason that the question had been deferred from the beginning of the term which had left the schools without any system of writing being taught.

Superintendent Hisey promulgated an order among the teachers directing that they should be in school at 7:30 o'clock on Monday morning.

It is expected that delegations of veterans and citizens will come from the surrounding towns to join in the welcome.

The old soldiers and several of the committees met in the McKinley headquarters last night for the purpose of concluding the arrangements for the entertainment of the union generals.

The school board at the special meeting last night enlarged Prof. Hisey's order. All members of the history classes and pupils of the High school will be excused during the forenoon, and other grade pupils until 9:30.
