CONSUMPTION OF CORN. Eastern financial papers are commenting upon the report of the Bureau of Statistics showing a reduction per capita fu the con-sumption of corn since 1822. According to these figures the consumption in 1832 was \$3.33 per cent, whereas in 1886 it was only 14.33 per cent, whereas in 1886 it was only 14.33 per cent. The subject is an interesting one because of its bearing upon the future price of this cereal and consecuently upon the welfare of the "corn bell" country. From a per capita consumption in 1892 of 30.33 per cent the amount fell to 23.66 per cent in 1893, to 22.75 per cent in 1894, to 16.95 Deter cent in 1895 and to 14.55 per cent in 1896. Local grain men do not take any stock whatever in any such figures. There is al-most always a fail in the price of corn, as of hay and polateces and all other staples not largely exported, when a large crop is har-vested, and since the 1855 and 1896 corn crops have no parallel in the history of the country, it is unnecessary to look further than to that fact for an explanation of the discourseling prices.

While it is still some time before the stor-ing of eggs can be commenced, the storage people are already figuring on the outlook, and if they are anywhere near the truth in their predictions the future is not very promising for the producers. Many of the largest shippers and dealers in eggs expect to see eggs sell for storage this poring at 5 cents per dogen, while the possibility of 6 to 7 cents being paid seems to them very remote.

Temote. The fact that storage men generally lost money the past year may account in part for the bearish feeling noted regarding the future of the market. The open winter has kept up the production of eggs to such a degree that it has been impossible to un-

n degree that it has been impossible to un-load the storage eggs at a price sufficient to give 'solders a profit. Last year storage men were only anxious for the eggs, while price seemed to be a secondary consideration with many, but with the experience of the past season in mind it is hardly likely that they will bid the market up again very soon.
