RALLY CAUSED BY GOOD EXPORT BUSINESS

Onts and Corn Trail Along After the Leader, but Show a Little Less Vitality\_Provisions Lose a Few Cents.

CHICAGO, April 14.-Wheat was weak at the start today and strong at the finish, closing with a 1/2c advance. A good export business was responsible for the rally. Corn and oats trailed along after wheat, but did not have so much vitality, oats closing unchanged and corn a shade lower.

Provisions declined 25c to 10c.

Wheat speculators were rather at a loss which way to turn at the opening today. Right at the start the tone was firm and some of the early transactions were at the close last night, the strength being due to the unexpected action of the Liverpool market, which was ¼d to ¼d higher, not-withstanding the drop of ½c here yesterday. This brought a momentary rush of buying orders and for a short time the feeling seemed firm. But the trace soon began to seemed firm. But the trace soon began to suspect manipulation abroad, and the buyers got more cautious; then came rumors of the failure of Barney Barnato, the great Kaffir stock operator of London and South Africa, and in anticipation of a possible business panic atroad the speculative feeling turned bearish. The reported failure, however was not confirmed. Perhaps the principal bear factor was the fair weather west. Reports of rain day by day have finally made even some of the bears apprehensive, and when at last the sun did break through the clouds it gave the bears renewed couraged. St. Louis was a heavy seller in this market. Northwestern receipts were much lighter, Minneapolis and Duluth getting 23 carioads, against 504 the day before, 241 a week ago and 342 the corresponding day of last year. Liverpool opened at from 14d to 34d per centul higher. The export business which New York confirmed as having done yesterday amounted to 400,000 bu., and within an hour after the beginning of today's session fifteen boatloads of fresh business were reported. Duluth advised sales made there yesterday of 1,150,500 bu. and of eight boatloads more today. Wheat, which closed yesterday at 57% 667%c, opened with sellers and sales at from 51% 357%c, and in the course of haif an hour the price had receded to 65% 36%. It started upward from the latter point, and through much opposition it forced its way a very little at a time until it got to 58%c just at the close. July kept about 36c discount under May until near the end. When it dropped 16c below it.

The improvement in the weather started corn weak, and the market remained in that condition all morning. An improvement started on the small estimated receipts for tomorrow, the raily being helped by the latest strength of wheat and nearly all the early loss was recovered.
