MEMPHIS, Tenn., April 19.—The Tennessee Derby, which was won at a famous gentry park today by A. Cab's chestnut colt Buckyride, by Belvidere, out of Latheran Lass, Typhoon II finished second, with Algot third.

The attendance was 8,000. The Derby was the third on the program. Algot opened the event and was backed to 4 to 3. The small betters put their faith in Buckyride at 1 to 1 throughout.
