LINCOLN July 12.-(Special.) - Sheriff Huberle of Once county brought a prisoner to the penitentiary today, and his expense bill has caused a mild sensation at the state house. The bill as made out and sworn to by Mr. Huberle calls for \$1.75 railfond fare. for prisoner and \$6 for his own fare. The warrant was issued for the amount claimed, and the sheriff teck it and left. In the meantime Warden Leiorgh of the penitentlary was at Nebraska City this forenoon, and calling to see Sheriff Huberle was told that that official had left for Lincoln over the B. & M. Leidigh came back on the Missouri Pacific train and went down to the penitentiary, where he learned from his clerk that Huberle had come in on the B. & M. with the prisoner, and the train having stopped near the pen, the sheriff had walked up, obtained his receipt for the prisoner and departed for the state house. Leidigh came to the state house, and learning what sort of a bill the sheriff had presented, he tried to stop the lesuance or payment of the warrant, but was to The warden was very angry over the matter and says be will consult the attor-ney general and bring at action against the sheriff for making out a false bill. He says the padding out of the sheriff's bills is of such frequent occurrence that an example must be made out of some one to put a stop to it, as the money thus obtained from the state runs into a large amoun during the year. The warden says that when sheriffs come out on the street car they always charge for back hire, and that the sheriff of Lancaster county makes the same charge when he takes a prisoner to the penitentiary in his own buggy, EXPOSITION DIRECTORS.
