Five miles above Boise City is built the headgate of the Boise and Nampa irrigation company. The head-gate is of solid masonry, with steel headgates twelve feet high and thirty feet wide. The main canal is fifty-two miles long and extends ten miles below Nampa, with main branches or laterals aggregating sixty-eight miles, making a total of 129 miles belonging to the company, all of which is in perfect working order. The main canal covers 70,-000 acres of the choicest land of the Boise valley. In the Nampa district three large reservoirs are located and will soon be built, covering 1,000 acres of land and with a capacity of 12,000 acres, for use as reservoirs to draw on in seasons of low water. Nampa is the junction of the main line of the Boise railroad, a growing town of 1,000 population. It is expected in a short time to connect the mining camps of Owyhee and the mining and timber fields of the Payette by rail from Boise City and Nampa.

The fruit, grown in great abundance in and around Boise City, is wonderfully tempting, luscious and finely flawored. The fruit growers around here pride themselves, not only in the quantity, but more especially on the quality. At the World's fair in 1893 the Boise exhibit of fruit in the Horticultural department was conspicuously notice-able on account of its size, flavor and fine appearance. It is estimated the fruit will not its owner at least 114 cents per pound. A very conservative estimate places the net average product of a full bearing orchard near this city at \$250 per acre. All the fruits grown in the temperate zone grow here in the

richest profusion.

In the way of vegetables the soil around Boise affords another lucrative industry. Think of it! Five hundred bushels of onlons Think of it?
