What Makes a Good Gain After Some Struggling. CORN SHOWS A FRACTIONAL ADVANCE

Oats is Heavy and Loss Slightly and Provisions Are Dull and Featureless, Mostly Declining in Small Amounts.

CHICAGO, Aug. 9.—Both hogs and bulls in the wheat market today and the bulls came out on the "July" side of the crowd known as the "July" side.

Wheat opened firm today, 1/16c higher than it closed Saturday, notwithstanding 1/2c decline at Liverpool to begin with.

Paris was higher, however, and most advices from Europe were exceptionally bullish. Reports from the northwest were not so rose-colored as they had been, and generally the news of the day favored the bulls.

CHICAGO, Aug. 9.—Trade in cattle was fairly active with a good demand from the start for fat cattle, firm to the higher, but the common

of half fat cattle sold rather slowly at steady prices. Sales were on a basis of from \$3.65 to \$3.85 for the poorest dressed beef steers

and from \$4.00 to \$5.00 for choice to extra cattle, with a few sales of heavy calves.

Hogs—Trade in hogs was active and the supply was liberal. Sales were on a basis of from \$10.00 to \$12.00 for the poorest dressed hogs

and from \$13.00 to \$15.00 for choice to extra hogs, with a few sales of heavy calves.
