Since the tremendous sentiment against the machine has showed its strength, Herdman and his pluggers have endeavored t turn the fide by giving out the statement that it is a Gallagher fight. They are trying to take Herdman in out of the wet as an issue and use Gallagher for a scapegoat in the hope that his personal popularity will carry them through. But so far this has had no better effect than the other scheme; Invested by the combine to befog the oppo-sition. The democrats who have united to overthrow the present rotten party organization fully understand that Gallagher is nonentity so far as this fight is concerned except as he is using his influence to help Herdman out in exchange for his appoint ment as chief of police.

A glance over the lists of delegates filed

Western Farmers Likely to Find a New

Movement is Largely Due to the Talk of a Raise in Enstern Rates.

Ever since the announcement that the lines east of Chicago would on September 6 advance the freight rates on corn from 15 to 20 cents per 100 pounds on all shipments from Chicago to the Atlantic seaboard there has been more or less excitement among western grain men, and there has been something of a fear that lines west of Chi cago would make a raise to agree with that of the eastern lines. So far as can be 'learned in local freight circles there is no immediate danger of such a happening.

Inquiry among freight men of the Union Pacific, the Missouri Pacific, the Burlington and the Northwestern systems brought out a general condemnation of the policy being pursued by the lines east of Chicago and also the fact that none of them anticipated, according to their statements any raise in grain rates among western lines this fall. The fact that none of the southern lines have yet made any increasin their rates on grain shipments and the further fact that nothing foreshadowing any such increase has yet appeared on the surface, is taken as an indication that much of the western grain will seek a southern out let and be exported from gulf ports HEAVY SHIPMENTS SOUTH.

Speaking of this matter, Assistant General Freight Agent Wood of the Union Pacific said: "I have heard no talk of a raise in grain rates among either western or southern lines to correspond with the increase by eastern lines on September 6. There are already large quantities of grain moving southward and there is apt to be more. Nearly all the wheat off our lines in Kansas is going south. There are also good southern shipments of other grains, bu there is more wheat than anything else going to the gulf ports."

Assistant General Freight and Passenger Agent Phillippi of the Missouri Pacific said: "Yes, there has been quite a little talk aused by the raise in grain rates announced by the eastern lines. I suppose they mus bave all the traffic they want to handle otherwise their action, it seems to me, would be almost suicidal. There is no doubt about grain is going southward. There is n talk of a raise in rates by the souther lines, and if none is made, the eastern lines will find the great shipments of western grain going southward instead of eastward hrough Chicago. We are hauling a great leal of grain toward the south now, and this quantity will be increased when the increase in rates on eastern lines become effective.

ROADS INCREASE CORN RATE. The new rates that will go into effect o September 6 will mean a slight increase for the roads between the Mississippi river and Chicago, as all rates are based from the east bank of the Mississippi river. The increase to the Omaha-Chicago lines will be slight, but it will be appreciable. The increase will be for the haul from the eas bank of the Mississippi river to Chicago. The following telegram, received by the Omaha office of one of the four Omaha-Chicago lines from the general freight agent yesterday explains this part of the proposition as follows: "Effective on September 6 the special rate on corn for syperember 6 the special rate on corn for expor from the Mississippi river and Chicago will be cancelled, and the rate thereafter will be from the east bank of the Mississippi river points to New York, 23 cents, which will make our proportionate rate on lake and rail 4 cents per 100 pounds instead of 29-10 cents, as at present,

As will be seen, the new order revoking the special rate that is now in effect will mean an increase of 1 1-10 cents per 100 pounds to all Omaha-Chicago lines,
