

MACHINE GETS IN ITS WORK

Club Swinging Inside the Political Lines. HERDMAN PLOTTERS PLAY A DEEP GAME

Put Up a Desperate Fight that They May Carry Democratic Primaries in Order to Get a New Lesson of Life.

The Herdman-Gallagher machine is working overtime and as the contest approaches, every means that a corrupt police administration can bring to bear is being used to carry today's democratic primaries to the interests of the combine that perpetuate itself in power.

Two weeks ago the machine men were confident of an easy victory, but now the desperation with which they are spending money and swinging every club in their reach indicates that they realize that the situation is hazardous.

While there are contesting delegations in the First, Second, Seventh and Ninth wards, the combine is concentrating its strength in the First and Second, where the fight will be hottest today.

PLAN OF STATE BUILDING

Structure May Be Made Available for an Auditorium. PROPOSITION IS UNDER CONSIDERATION

Architects Will Finish Superintendent of Construction with the Plans of Nebraska's Exposition Building, with Estimates.

The Nebraska exposition commission closed up its work yesterday afternoon and adjourned until September 7, when a special session will be held to receive reports from the superintendent of construction on the amount of material required for the state building.

The architects of the state building were instructed to furnish the superintendent of construction with a copy of the building plans, and he was instructed to make an estimate of material required and submit it to the commission at the special meeting.

At the afternoon session the question of a site for a state building was referred to President Neville, Commissioner Whitford and Assistant Secretary Nelson.

The department of Buildings and Grounds opened bids at 5 o'clock last evening for the construction of the Machinery and Electricity building.

The bids included interior plastering, but did not include the steel work, and it was announced that the lowest bid for the entire building was \$1,100,000.

GRAIN GOING TO THE GULF

Western Farmers Likely to Find a New Market. FARM PRODUCTS SEEK SOUTHERN OUTLET
