JULY WHEAT SHOWS A BREAK OF 2 CENTS

Corn and Onto Suffer from the Liquidation, Closing Lower, and Provisions Are flow and Unchanged.

CHICAGO, March 16.-The exceptionally favorable weather caused the most general liquidation in the wheat market today that has taken place for some time. July wheat at one time showed a brenk of nearly 2 cents. The closing decline was \60%c covering by shorts being responsible for the reaction. Corn and oats suffered from the liquidation in wheat and closed %c and %c lawer, respectively. Provisions were slow and showed little change at the close.

Wheat was very weak at the opening. The bearish sentiment among traders on last night's curb, and the continuance of remarkably favorable weather prevailing over the entire winter wheat section, was reflected fully. Opening prices for July ranged from 85%c to 85½c, against a closing of 85%c yesterday. For a moment or two the market hesitated. The opening decline in itself was sufficient to induce covering in a moderate degree and the market recovered a fraction, selling at 85½c. That was the extent of the bullishness. Offerings soon began to come in from all directions, headers apparently being discouraged at the excellent crop prospects. The decline also brought in stop-loss orders, and the pressure was greatly increased by prominent St. Louis operators offerings from that source being exceptionally heavy. The market fell pretty steadily to 84c, becoming quite nervous at around the bottom. A reaction then ensued. Professional saorts and many early sellers came in to cover lines showing good profits, and the market gradually assumed a degree of steadiness. By noon prices had recovered to 85c. During this time May was steadily held by the Leiter interests at \$1.04 and that price in fact was maintained throughout the session, although one or two sales were made at \$1.03½. Besides the fine weather, which was the overshadowing influence, there was a good deal of bearishness in the routine news. Northwest receipts were 261 cars, against 334 cars last week and 231 a year ago. Chicago receipts amounted to 111 cars, -17 of which were of contract grade. The total addition to the contract stocks today amounted to about 62,000 bu., fifty carloads and 4,500 bu. coming from private houses. Liverpool cables showed weakness all day. Clearances were light at 178,000 bu. In the afternoon the market again declined. Shorts had by that time been filled up, and when the market lost this supporting influence prices sagged at once. This brought sellers into the market again in increased numbers. July from 85½c, which point was reached for a short time, was pounded down to 84½c, and was bringing 8½c, shounded down to 64,000 bu. The selling, and prices declined sharpy in consequence of the prices declined sharpy in c in itself was sufficient to induce covering in a moderate degree and the market re-

down to 84%c, and was bringing 84%68%c at the close.

Corn suffered from liquidation and short selling, and prices declined sharply in consequence. Fine weather and the wheat weakness were the factors. Selling was quite general all day, and but little support was given. A fairly good cash business was done on the decline. May ranged from 25%c to 25%c, and closed %c lower at 254.6629%c. Liquidation in oats was quite as free and general as was the case in corn, and the market was weak all day. Wheat and cern were the influences. A good deal of long property was disposed of, scalpers and professional shorts also pressing the market. There was some rally from the bottom on covering. Casa demand was good at the decline. May ranged from 26025% to 25% 625%, and closed 42 lower at 2546025%.

Provisions were in the main steady, considering the weakness in grain. This was a factor early, there being some sympathetic selling and prices declined somewhat. Selling was at no time heavy, and moderate selling by shorts on the decline caused a recovery, the market ruling steady within a narrow range to the close. At the close May pork was 2½c lower at \$3.77%; May lard, 2½c lower at \$5.05, and May ribs, unchanged at \$5.02½.
