PORK MAKES A REMARKABLE ADVANCE

It Shows a Net Gain of Eighty Cents, Followed by Lard with Sixty-Five Cents and Ribs with Forty-Five Cents.

CHICAGO, May 11-Provisions had a ver-Itable boom on 'change today. Pork at the close showed a net gain of soc a barrel, lard 65c a hundred weight and ribs 45c. The pro-nounced bull movement in hog products was based on the lively cash demand by the government for army uses. Leading packers were all on the buying side and were assisted by a revival of outside speculation. The wheat pit was deserted for corn and provisions, but the market continued to be extremely erratic. July covered a range of 51%c, closing at \$1.16%, a net ss of 31gc. May declined 6c, while September, to which month speculation is be-ing transferred, closed at a net gain of 13-Sc. Corn was helped by the rise in provisions and closed at an advance of lc for

July and oats gained 3-Sc. The provision market today shook off the The provision market today shook off the lethargy under which it has been laboring while grain markets were on the decline. It was a bull market from start to finish and led all others in point of specu-lative interest. No new feature of the phases of the business that are open to pub-lle inspection could be discerned to account for the great strength developed, and it must therefore be supposed that something in the internal working of the packing business had not until today been quite ready for the move that has its expression in the provision pit. All the large packers took a hand in the buying. Armour, Swift and the Cudahys were said to be the heav-lest purchasers. The best buying of the session was in lard. As this commodity is traded in by the hundred weight, its ad-vance of 65c is equivalent to 516 per there. The local run of hogs was 35,000 head. At principal western packing points 85,000 head were received, agalants 75,000 a year ago. Toward the middle of the session moderate realizing sales caused temporary reactions, but he highest rates of the day were pre-valing at the close. July pork closed at \$11.579, an advance of 50c, lard at \$6.55, or 65c up, and ribs for July \$6.05, a net gain of \$50. 
