SUMMARY OF AVERAGES ON ALL GRAINS

Percentages Run High and the Figures Indicate a Prosperous Year for the Farmers of the Hawkeye Commonwealth.

DES MOINES, July 10 .- (Special.)-The reports of county and township correspondents of the Iowa weather and crop service made a flattering showing of the condition of the crops on July 1, 1898, as will be seen by the following summary of averages for the state: Winter wheat, 97 per cent; spring wheat, 99; corn, 102; oats, 98; rye, 97; barley, 100; millet, 98; flax, 98; broom corn, 93; potatoes, 102; sweet potatoes, 97; sorghum, 99; meadows, 108; pastures, 105; apples, 79; pears, 71; plums, 70; peaches,

88; grapes, 99. On July 1, 1897, the same correspondents reported the average condition of the staple crops at much lower figures, as follows: Winter wheat, 61 per cent; spring wheat, 88; corn, 76; oats, 83; barley, 93; rye, 87; flax, 88; millet, 100; broom corn, 82; potatoes, 92; sweet potatoes, 92; sorghum, 85; apples, 84; plums, 72; grapes, 80; timothy and clover, 89.
