Omaha, Chicago and Manitoba in a Bunch Under the Wire.

Minnesota and Denver Sure of Their Places - Yesterday's Matches Come Out in the Natural Order.

Omaha defeated Denver and Manitoba put the blocks to Minnesota yesterday, the last day of play in the tournament of the Northwestern Cricket association. Omaha, Manitoba and Chicago are tied for the championship, with three victories and one defeat each, Minnesota fourth with one victory and three defeats, and Denver at the tail end with four defeats and nary a winning.

This leaves matters in an unsatisfactory state, to be sure, but that is the way they will have to stay unless the teams shake dice for the "rag." Figuring won't do a bit of good. Omaha defeated Chicago, which beat Manitoba, to be sure; but Chicago skinned Manitoba, which whipped Omaha, and Manitoba lambasted Omaha, which skunked Chicago. And there you are. Anyway there is no question of Minnesota's and Denver's place in the running.

The biggest crowd that has yet been in attendance at the tournament was out, among whom was more than the proper proportion of the fair ones. Those who came the later spectators were left out in the cold. The reason for this was that in each match the first innings so far settled things that on account of the lateness of the hour the defeated aggregations saw no hope of winning and therefore were willing to call the


