New Features of Naval Warfare Developed by Uncle Sam.

OLD NECESSITY AROUSES THE FAMILY

Colliers, Water Boats, Refrigerators, Hospitals, Machine Shops and Arsenals-Only a Floating Dry Dock Needed.

The present tendency toward specialization is well exemplified by the special vessels which have come to be regarded as of modern war ships. In warfare upon the sea, relates the New York Sun, the United States has always been a pioneer-a fact number of military and naval attaches engaged in watching our operations. These foreign officers are particularly impressed by the novelty of some of the classes of ships which have been made a part of the American navy, and many exhaustive repital, repair, supply and reserve ships have been mailed to foreign countries. In former days ships were built of wood, with coppered bottoms, and carried large supplies of water and provisions. If repairs to the sails were needed they were effected by the sailmaker and his mates; the carpenter's gang sufficed to replace broken spars and even to refit the ship to a considerable extent after an action; while the

rigging was kept in order by the seamen, under the supervision of the boatswain. The necessity for coaling did not exist, and tom was overhauled with sufficient thoroughness. Before leaving port all the boilers are filled with fresh water, water in the boilers runs low and more must be pumped in. All boilers are fitted with a sea injection, and as a last resource the sea is drawn upon to keep the water up to the working level. As this process is repeated from time to time, the water becomes intensely salt, scale is deposited, and rapid deterioration is inevitable, finally resulting in leaky tubes, falling crown sheets, and the ruin of the boiler, unless repairs can be had. The necessity for the care and preservation of the boilers is very urgent and the problem of keeping up the fresh water supply has been solved by our naval engineers, who have designed a distilling ship, the Iris, which is fitted with a monster evaporating plant, capable of converting hundreds of thousands of gallons of sea water into fresh water every week. The Iris is fitted with powerful pumps to enable her rapidly to transfer the fresh water into the boilers of any vessel that require refilling.
