Charged with Firing the Shots that Killed Elmer E. Green.

ACCUSED MAN IS PLACED UNDER ARREST

Autopsy Elleits Evidence that Causes the Coroner's Jury to Charge Baker with the Killing.

BELLEVUE, Neb., Aug. 10 - (Special.) This afternoon County Attorney W. R. Patrick filed a complaint with Justice of the Pence Goss, charging Herbert V. Baker with the murder of Elmer E. Green. The complaint followed the verdict returned by the coroner's jury. Baker was immediately placed in chage of an officer and it is probable that he will be able to give ball. Murder in the second degree is what is charged in the complaint. The autopsy showed that the shots which caused Green's death were fired by Baker. As was formerly stated, it was thought that Green had committed suicide immediately after shooting his wife. but it appears that the bullet he intended for himself was not fatal. The two bullets from Baker's revolver were of a different callber from those fired by Green and were found to have been the direct cause of death.


Daily Paper Suspends.
