NEW YORK AND LIVERPOOL LEAD ADVANCE

Provision Market Again Attacked by Yellow Fever Reports and Rules Wenk-Corn and Oats

CHICAGO, Sept. 27 .- Wheat here today was led by an advance in New York. The strength of the latter market was a big factor in an advance of 5-8c here. Trading was much more active than usual. Corn and oats both advanced about 3-Sc. Provisions were weak owing to yellow fever reports

An advance of 1-8@%c marked the opening in wheat, December starting at 64%@ 64 3-8c, compared with yesterday's closing price of 64 1-8c. Some irregularity was shown by the market for a time, the price fluctuating between 64 1-8@64% c and 64% c as the demand from shorts, the principal early fluctuating between 64 1-82644gc and 644gc as the demand from shorts, the principal early buyers, increased or diminished, but in the main the market showed firmness and kept near to the figures of the opening. North-western receipts, though heavy, were smal-ler than last year. Minneapolis and Duluth reported 1,716 cars, against 520 last week and 1,872 a year ago. The early strength was due largely to the advance at Liver-pool, where futures were quoted 34/67-53 higher. The bullish feeling was increased by seaboard reports of a good inquiry for wheat for shipment to the United Kingdom and heavy acceptances here for prompt shipment. Chicago receipts were 275 cars, seven of contract grade. Frimary western receipts aggregated 1,727,000 bu. compared with 1,625,000 bu. last year. Atlantic port clearances were 513,000 bu. Juluth, Minne-spolis and New York markets were all strong for cash wheat. Bradstreet's re-ported the world's visible increase at 2,416,-000 bu. Of this amount 1,900,000 bu. was cast of the Rockles and, as yesterday a de-crease of 880,000 bu. had been officially re-ported, buyers were given a shock and for a few minutes there was a rush of longs to get rid of their wheat. The price was crushed down to 64 1-8c from around 64/4c in this flurry. But a reaction quickly fol-lowed. Instead of following Chicago's lead, New York and the northwest markets be-came stronger than ever and when this lowed. December climbed to 64%0647-8c in the scramble. New York re-ported eighty-one boatloads worked for ex-port, which, coming near the end of the session, was a factor in the strength with which the market closed. Business was very active after noon and the total bus-iness done was larger than for some time. December closed at 64%c.

There was a good deal of aggressive buying by professional buils, forcing shorts to cover. Firmness was apparently entirely in sym-pathy with wheat. Receipts were 889 cars. Cables were higher. Clearances were 172,-000 bu. December ranged from 297-8c to 20% 039 3-8c and closed 3-8c higher at the

30%4730 3-8c and closed 3-8c higher at the latter price. Oats was firm but very slow. The mar-ket trailed after wheat and corn and de-veloped independent features. Trading was light and in scattered lots, mostly by lo-cals, Clearances were light. Receipts were 542 cars. Cash market firm. May ranged from 22%4622 7-8c to 23c and closed ½463-8c higher at 23c.

From 22% G227-Sc to 23c and closed ¹/₄G3-Sc higher at 23c. Provisions averaged weak and lower. Yellow fever reports and liberal hog re-ceipts started the market at a decline. Packers gave the market at fair support for a time and a recovery ensued, but when this buying stopped prices quickly declined again and the market remained weak to the close. Trading was only moderately active. At the close January pork was 71% lower at \$9.20, January lard 5c lower at \$9.24, May ribs 5c lower at \$4.77%. 
