OPERATIONS IN STOCKS AND BONDS.

All the Active Railroad Stocks Show Small Net Advances.

NEW YORK, Oct. 17.—A scrutiny of the list of changes in prices today will show that nearly all of the railroad stocks dealt in have net gains of a small fraction.

Considering the number of unsettling episodes in the day's market these gains, though small, indicate a strong resisting power in stocks.
