NEW YORK, Oct. 17 .- A scrutiny of the list of changes in prices today will show that nearly all of the railroad stocks dealt in have net gains of a small fraction. Considering the number of unsettling cpl-

In have net gains of a small fraction. Considering the number of unsettling epi-sodes in the day's market these gains, though small, indicate a strong resisting power in stocks. Although the opening was slightly higher in sympathy with the rise in London the tendency of prices turned downwards early in the day under the influence of a break in Tobacco on apprehension that the su-preme court would deliver today a decision unfavorable to the railroads in the case to test the legality of the Joint Traffic associa-tion. The coalers were subjected to attack by the bears and the valuation of the stocks lowered to an extent surprising even for these much belabored securities. New Jersey Central fell an extreme 5½ per cent and the decline in the rest of the group ranked from 1½321 per cent. Metropolitan Street Railway broke 3½ points and the whole list touched the lowest prices of the day. None of the active rail-road stocks fell over 1½ points net. The weakening of the new federal securities, after opening actively, were also a bear factor. Tobacco was dealt in minus the dividend of 2 per cent and 13-5 there. The day the shorts were driven to cover by a rise of 5½ per cent. Sugar was also well supported all day. London was a buyer in this market, especially of the Pacifies.
