Spurt in the Wheat Market Comes Just Before the Closs of Trading.

LEAVES OFF A FOURTH TO EIGHTH BETTER

Corn Follows Example of Wheat and Finishes Strong After Weak Opening-Ribs a Shade Higher.

CHICAGO, Fvb. 24.-Wheat was lifeless and heavy today until within thirty minites of the close, when a sudden revival of the export d mand changed the course f the market and May wheat left off 146 he higher. Corn acted in unison with wheat and closed % higher after early weakness. Oats rose the, Pork closed 5c lower, lard unchanged and ribs a shade higher.

The general surroundings of the wheat market were unchanged at the commence-ment. Cables were lifeless, the weather was not a disturbing factor and Argentine shipments to Europe for the week were about as anticipated. Under those curcumstances wheat opened a shade lower at from 73c to 734/9/734c, and for an hour or so gave very little indication of getting far from those figures. Chicago received nin ty-five cars, against seventy-five cars a year ago. Minneapolls and Duluth receipts were 402 cars, compared with 257 for the corre-sponding day last year. The Argentine snipments of wheat for the week were 1,28,000 bu, against 1,46,000 bu, the year before.

Some bearishness was imparted to the market by estimates of a large increase in northwest stocks during the week. Receipts market by estimates of a large increase in northwest stocks during the week. Receipts of wheat at western primary markets amounted to \$52,000 bu, whereas only 417,000 bu, were ricelved for the same day last year, Atlantic port clearances were equal in wheat and flour to \$52,000 bu. After backing and filling between 725c and 734c for May wheat until the last hour of the session the market became weak and looked for awhile as if it was going to break up into little plees, when rumors of considerable export business having been done commenced to be circulated. Soon it became known that 100,000 bu, of wheat held in New York by a Chicago firm had been sold for export and that 200,000 bu, of Kansas wheat had been disposed of to be shipped by way of the gulf ports. New York wired also that late Lendon cables bid 5d more for wheat than disposed of to be shipped by way of the guif ports. New York wired also that late London cables bid 5d more for wheat than the price at which they accepted the offers of yesterday. That changed the whole complexion of the market, and from being listless and inclined to go lower it became very strong and quite active. May wheat mounted in a few minutes from 72% to 75% and before the end it brought 73% c, with the latest trading at 73% 75% 75%. Lack of outside speculation, free country offerings and liberal receipts depressed corn early. The market was very heavy and during the middle hour of the session hardly a trade was made. The sudden upward whirl in wheat, however caused a rally in corn, and during the lats fifteen minutes of the session the market gave a wonderful exhibition of bullish spirit, considering the duliness of its previous aspect. 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
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
