The local house is a branch of a St. Louis firm. The fight upon it as far as Omaha is concerned started before it came to this taker's, city. Last fall the Omaha plumbers declared a boycott upon its goods because it persisted in selling them at a lower figure than other houses. In retaliation for this boycoit the St. Louis firm in January last instailed a branch house in this city and commenced to prosecute an aggressive war upon

Its plan of campaign succeeded. It is that the new house has secured 60 per cent of all plumbing business that is being done or has been done in the city this spring. It has secured this business simply by underbidding other firms. A strike has been declared among its employes, those plumbers who stayed by it have been suspended by their union and it has been declared an unfair shop, but all of this has failed to stop the prosperity of the new house or to increase its prices for plumbing work.

About two weeks ago the matter was brought to a climax. The plumbing establishment decided to fight the boycott and the strike. The local plumbers' union was As a consequence the case was carried to the executive committee of the national plumbers' organization. This committee could not be gotten together and delegated authority, with power to act, upon President Kelly of the organization to decide the case. After listening to both sides union. The plumbing establishment nevertheless declined to charge more for its plumbing work and carried the case over President Kelly's head to the executive committee. This committee has displayed an inclination to reopen the case and the local union has threatened to secede if it


