DAUGHTER SEEKS TO RECOVER PROPERTY

Mary B. Shelby Alleges that Her Has Been Debauched Out of a Large Fortune Owned by Her Father.

The suit of Mary B. Shelby against John A. Creighton, which is a side issue of the famous Creighton will case, is now on trial before Judge Dickinson.

Among his other business ventures Edward Creighton was the senior partner in the firm of Edward Creighton & Co., which owned large herds of cattle in Laramie county, Wyoming, and Cheyenne county, Nebraska.

After the usual proceedings in probate court John A. Creighton was appointed special administrator of the estate and on a second application he was confirmed as general administrator.

McShane appointed administrator of the estate in Wyoming, and that with McShane's assistance Creighton contrived to buy the entire property for \$75,000.

By the terms of the will Edward Creighton's will one-twentieth of the estate was left to Joseph Creighton, from whom the interest descended to his daughter, Mary Shelby.
