Affairs of the Late Edward Creighton in District Court.

DAUGHTER SEEKS TO RECOVER PROPERTY

Mary B. Shelby Alleges that She Has Been Defrauded Out of a Large Fortune Owned by Her Father.

The cuft of Mary B. Shelby against John A. Creighton, which is a side issue of the famous Oreighton will case, is now on trial before Judge Dickinson. This is one of the most important cases on the equity docket this term and will probably continue for several days. The suit involves the right to the profits of a sale of the entire ranch property of the late Edward Creighton, with herds of cattle that are alleged to have been

worth nearly \$1,000,000. Among his other business ventures Edward Creighton was the sentor partner in the firm of Edward Creighton & Co., which county, Wyoming, and Cheyenne county, Nebraska. Creighton died in 1874, leaving an estate which the petition declares was worth fully \$1,100,000. His interest in the ranch property was listed at \$132,284 when the partnership was formed several years before, and it is alleged that it was worth several times that amount when he died.

After the usual proceedings in probate court John A. Creighton was appointed special administrator of the estate and on a second application he was confirmed as general administrator. Then the transaction occurred that Mrs. Shelby now asserts defrauded her of her rights. She declares that John A. Creighton succeeded in having Thomas A. McShane appointed administrator of the estate in Wyoming, and that with McShane's assistance Creighton contrived to buy the entire property for \$75,000. She declares that adequate notice was given of the sale and that the purchase price never actually passed. Her next contention is that soon after John A. Creighton sold the same property for \$800,000, and that in the meantime portions of the cattle were sold for amounts aggregating nearly \$250,000 more.

By the terms of Edward Creighton's will

one-twentieth of the estate was left to Joseph Creighton, from whom the interest de-scended to his daughter, Mary Shelby. Mrs. Shelby now sues to compel John A. Creighton to make an accounting of the proceeds of the sale of the ranch property in order that she may receive her share of the

WINTER-SHIELDS CASE GOING ON.

Ballots of First Four Wards Are Nearly Counted. Judge Powell has nearly completed the

canvass of the votes cast for county attorney in the first four wards of Omaha at the last general election. The complete figures of the First, Second and Third wards indicate that if either of the contentions of Mr. Winter is sustained he will come out with a clear majority over Shields.

The official count of the vote cast in these wards gave Winter 1,878 and Shields 2,474. The result of Judge Powell's canvass indicates that 40.1 per cent of the Shields vote in these wards was not in the democratic column. If this proportion is maintained through the county it means that 1,585 of Shields' total vote consists of votes that were cast for him as a populist or silver republican candidate. If it is decided that these votes cannot be legally counted for the democratic candidate the effect would be to eliminate Shields' majority and elec

Winter by a decisive majority. The petition filed by Mr. Winter also sets up the contention that in cases in which a voter votes the straight populist or silver republican ticket by a mark in the circle at the head of the column, such votes cannot be counted for Winter. In the twentynine precincts of the first three wards there were 470 of these ballots, or an average o 17 to the precinct, If this proportion is maintained and Mr. Winter's contention holds good, the effect would be to elect

Winter by a majority of 637. Although the count has not gone far enough to warrant a positive forecast, there is every indication that Shield's idea that he received enough democratic votes to elect him without counting the populist and silver republican ballots will not hold good by several hundred votes.

Counterfeiter Pleads Guilty.

John McNamara, the counterfeiter from Juniata, this state, was called before Judge Munger again yesterday and changed his plea from not guilty to guilty, whereupon he was sentenced to three months in the county jail. McNamara is the farmer who harbored a tramp one night last winter and who at that time taught him to coin spurious dimes, quarters and half dollars. While McNamara made a few of the counterfeit coins they were so poor that he did not succeed in passing any of them.

Water Company is Sued Again. Damage suits against the Omaha Water company on account of the Patterson block fire continue to accumulate. The aggregate now amounts to over \$100,000 and it is stated that petitions are being prepared in several additional cases. The suit of Sabbia Brosius has just been filed. McCague Talks of Plans of Illinois Central for Entering Omaha

The statement made by President Burt of the Union Pacific, that the Illinois Central will come into Omaha over the Union Pacific bridge and not over the property of the Omaha Bridge and Terminal company, is corroborated by John L. McCague, the representative of the Illinois Central in the acquirement of right-of-way. He states that it has never been the intention of the Illinois Central to come into Omaha by any

other route than the Union Pacific bridge "All the property the road has been buying on the other side of the river has led directly to the latter bridge," said Mr. Mc-Cague, "and not one foot of ground has been bought near the terminal company's property. The differences between the terminal company and the Union Pacific will therefore, it is said, have absolutely no effect upon the status of the Illinois Central in Omaha."

Babcock's New Position. W. N. Babcock, general western passenger and freight agent of the Delaware, Lackawanna & Western Railroad company, is in the city for a day or two. 
